TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, Dec. 1st.—Most of the features usually attending the opening were lacking today at the convening of the second session of the 66th Congress. After perfunctory sessions at which the annual appropriation estimates aggregating \$4,865,000,000 were presented both Senate and House adjourned until tomorrow, when President Wilson's message will be read, and legislative work started in earnest.

Paris, Dec. 2nd.—The Supreme Council today decided that the question of Fiume should not be settled in the Hungarian Peace Treaty, but be reserved for final decision by the Allied and Associated Powers. This eliminates any objections on the part of either the Italians or the Jugo-Slavs, to signing the Treaty on account of Fiume.

London, Dec. 2nd.—Field Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood, sailor, soldier and author, died here today. He was born at Cressing Braintree, Essex, on February 9th, 1838.

Washington, Dec. 2nd.—General recommendation on legislation to combat the cost of living, labour unrest, radicalism and readjustment of the nation to a peace footing, were the features of President Wilson's annual message to Congress; delivered today. The Peace Treaty, the President told Congress, will be discussed in a separate message later, as well as the railway question.

London, Dec. 2nd.—By the substantial majority of 192 the House of Commons decided against the proposition to float premium bonds in order that the Government might raise needed money. Judging from the cheering that greeted the announcement of the figures, the decision of the Chamber was a popular one. Public opinion, aided by the Archbishop of Canterbury, and other prominent churchmen and financiers, had expressed itself forcibly during the past two years against the bonds, and evidently converted many of the public, hitherto at least sympathetic with a lottery bond issue. Mr. Austen Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, in the course of a speech on the question in the House, confessed that his former advocacy of the bonds was the result of insufficient study of the subject.
