ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Athens, June 14th.—The hope of a new coalition for putting an end to the Ministerial crisis has disappeared, in consequence of a meeting of the principal committee of the National Assembly at which it was decided to make preparations for the dissolution of Parliament and proceed with new elections. Negotiations for the formation of a Cabinet still continue.

Paris, June 14th. A Hava's despatch from London to the Temps confirms the report that the Superior Council is considering certain important modifications in the Treaty of Peace with Turkey. The pacific intentions of France in Asia Minor, as shown by the conclusion of an armistice between General Gouraud and Mustapha Kemal, are generally well received in England and there is reason to believe that the French point of view regarding the relations of the Western States with the Ottoman Empire is gaining ground in British public opinion.

Genoa, June 15th.—An International Maritime Conference has commenced here, 16 States being represented by two hundred delegates and technical advisers.

Paris, June 16th.—The Rome correspondent of the "Petit Parisien" telegraphs that the Chief of the Forces operating against the Italians has invited the Italian Commander to evacuate Avlona, under threat of severe measures against prisoners.

Berlin, June 16th.—According to the "Germania," the organ of the Centre Party, Herr Fehrenbach, President of the Assembly having declined the post

Rome, June 16th.—The local strikes of railwaymen at Milan, Florence and Pisa are decreasing and several trains are now running.

Paris, June 16th.—The "Temps" announces that a French battalion which occupied Bozanti in Cilicia, was made prisoner by the Turks at 20 kilometres from Adana, the failure of their ammunition having compelled them to surrender. It is hoped that the commander at Angora will have sufficient authority to intervene in Cilicia, and obtain the release of the prisoners, as required by the armistice.

Athens, June 14th.—The Govt. has decided to call up the classes of 1921 in advance.

St Thomas, June 20th.—Cable between San Juan, P. R., and Jamaica repaired, restoring communication with Jamaica and all points beyond via this Company's lines.

London, June 13th.—The Cabinet today discussed the Irish question and received reports from Sir Hamar Greenwood. According to the "Daily Mail",

the Chief Secretary advised the Cabinet that the measures taken were proving successful and said he hoped shortly to arrest some of the principal terrorist leaders in Ireland.

Paris, June 12th.—Fifteen thousand tons of wheat, destined for England, have been diverted to Germany and will be held to forestall the shortage there. Large stocks of frozen mutton will be sent to Germany from British storage houses.

Muirfield, June 12th.—Mr. Tolley won the British Amateur Golf Championship yesterday, defeating Mr. Gardner of Chicago by one hole.

Sherringham, June 12th.—M. Leitch lost the British women's golf championship yesterday to M. Wethered of the Worplesdon Club, who won by two up and one to play.

Mexico City, June 12th.—Two proved cases of bubonic plague have been discovered in the republic of San Salvador.

New York, June 12th.—Sir Thomas Lipton arrived here today aboard the Celtic.

Newport, R. I., June 12th.—The yacht Resolute won today in the sixth race with the Vanitie, over a Windward and Leeward course of thirty miles, making

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
