LOCAL.

Among the passengers by the tourist steamer was Mr. Antonio Alexander who has been taking a mercantile course in New York.

A number of tourists visited this to n yesterday and a score of them lunched at the Penheny Hotel.

One of the distinguished passengers on the Fort Victoria to visit Christiansted yesterday was Mr. V. Sydney Rothschild, a member of the New York stock exchange, author, traveler and linguist, who beheld the stage set for the world war and witnessed the curtain rise in Germany, France, Belgium, England, Italy and America. Mr. Rothschild has a broad and interesting experience. He was for awhile major in the quartermaster corps of the American army but for the last two years has been recuperating from a nervous breakdown. During this time he translated an Italian war drama, "The Soul of the People," giving all benefits to the Italian Red Cross. He also wrote "The Armageddon Trilogy", all benefits going to the war savings committee, U. S. treasury department. The Armageddon Trilogy was written the morning of May 24, 1915, on Italy's entry into the war and was highly commended by the litterateur and then American Ambassador to Rome, Thomas Nelson Page, a name with which many of our readers are doubtless familiar.

Among the passengers on the "Martha Washington" which touched at St. Thomas last week, were former Despatching Secretary and Mrs. R. G. Williams en route to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, where Mr. Williams fills the post of agent for the United States Shipping Board.

The mail-boat Creole is here today with St. Thomas mails.

The Virginia is also in Frederiksted like a "brick" and mails may be looked for at noon.
