TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Oct. 15th.—German marks made another low record, preliminary quotations being 0.6775 cents.

Bombay, Oct. 16th.—It is reported from Malabar that a big offensive against the Indian revolutionists is expected to begin almost immediately.

London, Oct. 16th. Lord Robert Cecil, speaking at Hull on Saturday, said, he considered the great blot on the League of Nations was the fact that it contained no working men delegates. He emphasized the urgent need of Govt. control of the manufacture of arms, in order to minimize incitement to war. He said that

Germany ought to be admitted to the League and he believed she would have been admitted at the recent assembly if she had applied.

London, Oct. 15th.—There has been a considerable response to the appeal of the Prince of Wales on behalf of the British Empire exhibition. Guarantees amounting to several thousands sterling have already been received.

Halifax, N. S. Oct. 16th.—One of the most interesting of recent shipping developments in the British West Indies is seen in the activities of Messrs. Furness Withy and Company, Ltd., who having obtained the contract to maintain a service of two first class passenger liners in the Winter and one in the Summer between New York and Bermuda, have now obtained certain concessions in that colony, and have in view the erection of an hotel and the preparation of a golf course at Tuckerstorm.

Athens, Oct. 17th—The Gounaris Government received a vote of confidence from the National Assembly on Saturday, in spite of the threats of the opposition. The Government incurred no real danger, as the opposition under Nicholas Stratos was small, and the Venizelists refused to support it, owing to their distrust of Stratos.

Warsaw, Oct. 17th—M. Tronkiewitz, Secretary of the Polish Repatriation Commission now in Moscow, has been murdered in that city, it is said in advices which have reached here.

Berlin, Oct. 17th—Flags have been raised in numerous places in the Kattowitz, Myslowitz, Pless and Rybnik districts of Upper Silesia, and former Polish insurgents armed with rifles are taking a stand to guard the new border, according to a despatch to the Abendblatt.

London, Oct. 17th—"That Mr. Lloyd George has seen his way to go to Washington after all is the best possible news," says "the Sunday Times." No one could thoroughly fill his place there, no one could bring home so well to the American people the conviction that we are in earnest about the things for which the conference stands. His presence will make all the difference between representations and delegation. When Mr. Lloyd George speaks to the United States, she will feel that she has the mind of Great Britain at first hand."

London, Oct. 17th—The Irish conference had another two hours session today. Complete reticence is maintained as to the nature of the discussion, which is believed to have concerned the Ulster question. The date of the next meeting will be fixed later.

London, Oct. 17th.—Sir Eric Geddes, Minister of Transportation, has tendered his resignation from that office, it was learned today.

London, Oct. 18th.—Sugar in stock on the 15th inst. was 100,000 tons. Last year 117,000 tons.
