Paris agreement from different angles and come to different conclusions.

Paris, Jan. 31st.—Satisfaction with the decisions arrived at yesterday by Supreme Allied Council with regard to German reparations was expressed unanimously by newspapers here. Many journals praised M. Briand for the manner in which he conducted the interests of France during the sessions of the Council.

Copenhagen, Jan. 31st.—M. Krassin received only a lukewarm welcome in Moscow, when he returned recently with a draft of the proposed treaty. Both M. Lenine and M. Litvinoff of the Commissariat, consider the terms of the treaty unacceptable.

London, Jan. 31st.—William Gunn, the famous cricket professional, died at Nottingham yesterday. In his prime he was one of the best bats ever produced in England.

Adelaide, Jan. 31st.—Warren Caloha, the Hawaiian swimmer star, broke the world's record for the 100 metre event today, making the distance in 521 5 seconds.

## St. Thomas News.

Postmaster Streich left for Fajardo, P. R. to consult with Mr. Alberic Lightbourn of the U. S. Customs Department, relative to the acquisition of a good motor-boat for the conveying of mails and passengers between here and Porto Rico. This move is in virtue of Mr. Lightbourn's article which appeared in our issue of Saturday.—*St. Thomas Mail Notes, January 26.*

Mr. J. C. Kullee, of New Jersey, who is connected with the firm of J. Rosenberg & Co. arrived here last Tuesday by the s.s. Parima, and took over the tobacco factory. On Monday he started work, making cigars, with a small staff of 12 girls. It is expected that four or five hundred of them will be used for the making while about the same number will be used for the stripping of the tobacco.
