LOCAL

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Aug. 25th.—Salvage experts have at last succeeded in locating the

whereabouts of the wreck of the P and O liner "Egpyt," which went down on May 21st 1922 after having been in collision with the French steamer "Saine" off Ushant. The wreck has been found six miles from the scene of the accident, at a depth of sixty four fathoms. The underwriters have accepted the experts terms for an attempt to recover the gold ingots which the Egypt was carrying and which at present rates are estimated to be worth ten million pounds. Later an attempt may be made to refloat the vessel itself. Salvage operations it is said will start soon.

London, Aug. 25th.—All except a few bars of the thirty million dollars worth of gold bullion which dropped to the ocean when a German submarine sank the Laurentic off Donegal, Ireland, has been recovered by divers, who since 1918 have been carrying on their labours 90 feet below the surface of the sea. The 30 bars remaining in the wreck it is expected will be brought up within a week. In addition to the gold which was consigned to United States bankers, the Laurentic was laden with almost five million dollars in silver, mostly in two shilling pieces, all of which has been salvaged by the divers. The men have been using a diving spear with a dial attachment that shows whether the spear point is touching gold or a base metal such as iron.

New York, Aug. 25th.—Mr. Lloyd George, will visit Canada and the United States in September or November, said Sir Alfred Cope, under-secretary for Ireland during the Lloyd George regime, who arrived on the Mauretania yesterday to make arrangements for his former chief. The date will be before November 13th he added, as the former Premier wishes to be back in England on that date when Parliament convenes. Mr. Lloyd George's visit will not be political, Sir Alfred said.

Athens, Aug. 25th.—A telegram from the island of Imbros reports that a naptha launch flying the United States flag and carrying 10 refugees, was fired upon by Turkish soldiers at Gallipoli, one man being killed and a woman badly injured.

London, Aug. 26th.—The Prince of Wales, it is understood, intends to do some shooting when in Canada next month. No announcement has been made as to his itinerary when not at his ranch in Alberta. The Prince is now visiting in Scotland.

Simpia India, Aug. 26th.—Serious rioting, resulting in numerous casualties and much destruction of property, occurred on Friday at Saharanpur and Gonda, in the United Provinces, at the close of the Muharram religious celebrations. The police were able to quell the crowds only by the use of firearms. Minor disturbances occurred in Calcutta, Ahmedabad, Amritzer and Nellore. The tension is high, but the authorities have the situation in hand.
