TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Genoa, March 25th.—Mary Evelyn Thelbrick, of Bournemouth, England, was shot and killed yesterday by a sentry near Fort Speren. While wandering in the vicinity of the military limits a sentinel challenged the woman, who not knowing how to reply became terrified and attempted to flee. The sentry thereupon fired the shot that killed her. The incident has caused much regret among the population.

New York, March 25th.—Captain Nielsen and two officers of the Atlantic Fruit Liner "Glyndon" which sank sixty miles off Cape Hatteras on Saturday morning, were drowned and the remaining twenty-four members of the crew were saved by the steamer "Cananova" about noon on Saturday the Company learned today.

Havre, France, March 25th.—The MacLaren airplane, which began its world flight from England today, descended near here this afternoon, owing to the fog.

Ottawa, March 25th.—Canada exported 6,166,678 pounds of refined sugar in February 1924, worth \$609,625, about one-half the quantity exported in February 1923.

Toronto, March 25th.—By a vote of 84 to 6 the Legislature this afternoon de-

feated an amendment to the Ontario Temperance Act, proposed by Mr. Pinard (Liberal) East Ottawa, whereby seven per cent beer could be sold, instead of the present 2½ per cent beer.

Indianapolis, Indiana March 25th.—The rank and file of the United Mine Workers of America have ratified the new wage scale agreement, assuring peace in the bituminous industry for three years by an overwhelming vote, it was announced here this afternoon. The vote was 164,858 to 26,253.

Dublin, March 25th.—Today's session of the Dail Eireann was brief and peaceful, an early adjournment being taken out of sympathy with the victims of the Queenstown outrage and their families, without any of the airing of ministerial differences or resignations from the Cabinet that had been anticipated. Dublin has been buzzing with rumours of resignation of other ministers, even including President Cosgrave, but whether there is any foundation for them is not yet known. As has happened previously when a critical situation arose, all the members supporting the Cabinet met privately in the morning, so as to facilitate discussion, which would not be possible in the open Dail. President Cosgrave attended the meeting, as did Mr. Joseph McGrath, ex-Minister of Commerce, who it has been said was, with others, preparing to resign from the Dail. After the meeting the situation, which had grown out of the army troubles brought to light by the recent "mutiny" was described as much easier. President Cosgrave, who himself moved the adjournment said, with reference to the shooting. "In its deliberation and savagery it has no parallel. It is almost inconceivable that any civilized country could produce four men who could plot and carry out such a foul, callous deed. All the annals of savagery may be searched, but I doubt if any worse instance can be found. It made our people at home and our friends abroad hang their heads in shame."

London, March 25th.—The striking bus and tramway workers have rejected their employers offer of a five shillings increase in wages weekly, instead of the eight shillings demanded. Unless the strike is settled, the underground tubemen will leave their posts at midnight on Friday. Millions of Londoners would thus have to walk.

Ottawa, March 25th.—Steamship Companies serving Canada ports received a total of \$1,129,625 66 in subsidies from the Government in the fiscal year just ending. Figures cabled today at the request of Mr. Woodsworth, Centre Winnipeg, show that more than fifty companies are being subsidized to maintain a service between Canadian ports on the Pacific and the Atlantic Coasts, while several are giving a trans-oceanic service. The Royal Mail Steam Packet

Line received \$340,866 66 annually to maintain a service between Canadian Atlantic ports and the West Indies and South America. The next largest amount is paid the Elder Dempster Line which plies between Canada and South Africa. The Union Steamship Company of New Zealand is paid \$130,509 a year to preserve a service from Canada to New Zealand.

Bucharest, March 25th.—King George of Greece announced today he will refuse to abdicate the Greek Throne until a national plebiscite confirms the action of the Assembly at Athens in dethroning the Dynasty and declaring a republic.

Athens, March 26th.—The Greek Constitutional Committee issued a proclamation today against dethronement of the Dynasty, alleging that a republican militaristic majority was responsible for the Assembly's action. It urged the Greek people to make any sacrifice to support their constitutional rights. Preparations are under way to hold a national plebiscite.

Havre, France, March 26th.—The British round-the-world fliers took off for Lyons shortly after 11 a. m. today. The weather was cloudy and unfavorable.

Delhi, B. I., March 26th.—The Council of State has finally passed the finance bill, the provisions of which were virtually all rejected by the Swarajist majority in the Legislative Assembly. The Viceroy certified the bill, which is equivalent to overruling the Assembly.

Perth, Scotland, March 26th.—Western Australia state elections returns with the count still incomplete show 25 Labour candidates returned and so out of a total of 50 seats for the House of Assembly. A Labour Government to succeed the country party ministry of Sir James Mitchell now seems a certainty.

Dublin, March 26th.—President Cosgrave is asking the Dail today, for an appropriation, on account for the coming year totaling nearly 11,000,000 pounds. Of this amount 2,500,000 is for compensation of property losses suffered during the period of disturbance.

Benghazi, Africa, March 25th.—After long debate local Mussulmen have decided to replace the name of the Caliph with that of King Victor Emmanuel of Italy in the ritual of their prayers. The decision is taken as a final and complete acceptance of Italian rule by the Moslem population.

Sioux Falls, March 23th.—President Coolidge was leading Senator Hiram Johnson by nearly 2,500 votes for the Republican Presidential preference returns, available at midnight, from yesterday's statewide primary in South Dakota.

Melbourne, March 26th.—The Federal Premier Mr. Bruce announces the immediate construction of one light cruiser in Australia and one in England for the Commonwealth.
