### SERVICES IN THE LUTHERAN CHURCH.

Tuesday will be the Anniversary of the end of the great war. On Sunday morning this will be commemorated in a service of thanksgiving. Among the special and national hymns will be sung:

Gloria in Excelsis, ..... Composite.  
Te Deum ..... Jackson.

The afternoon session of the Sunday School will observe the same celebration and a commemoration of the hero Reformation.

The evening service will be the songs of the Reformation with a study of the lessons for today from the hero of the Reformation.

Virginia has not yet arrived in Frederiksted.

In regard to yesterday's report of the stock shipped by the schooner Ester Anita, it is now understood that the sheep, goats, and hogs mentioned, were not exported to the trade, but as ship stores. The vessel's destination with cargo was Barbados.

From a cablegram published in San Juan, P. R., and to be found in this issue, it will be noted that the strike of longshoremen at New York, ended on the 4th. It is now also known through private cable that the export of foodstuffs from Porto Rico is authorized. Flour can be had there at \$18 a bag, and cornmeal at a similar high figure.

### TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Stockholm, Nov. 3rd.—A despatch to the Tidende from Helsingfors says the famine in Petrograd is assuming terrible proportions. Forty thousand persons had died from starvation within a month, it is declared.

Helsingfors, Nov. 4th.—Associated Press. The Finnish Government in-

formed General Yudenitch today that it was unable to cooperate with him for the deliverance of Petrograd. (This is the Finnish reply to the appeal of the north western Russian Government for assistance, coupled with a recognition of the independence of Finland). The appeal was supported by General Mannerheim, formerly Commander of the Finnish Army.

Honolulu, Nov. 4th.—An eight year naval programme costing \$824,000,000 has been decided upon by the Japanese Government, it was announced here today in a cable message to the "Shinpuu," a Japanese daily newspaper. The program includes the construction of four 40,000 ton battleships of the Nagato class, four battle cruisers, twenty light cruisers, eighty destroyers, seventy submarines and thirty other craft.

New York, Nov. 4th.—Tammany Hall apparently went down to defeat in the municipal election here today. All three of its candidates for the Supreme Court bench seem to have lost.

Paris, Nov. 4th.—Following closely upon the snow-storm of several days ago, snow again fell in various parts of France yesterday. The fall in Paris was especially heavy, and was accompanied by intense cold. The Ardennes and Pyrennees are covered, the snow at one place reaching a depth of three feet. Marseilles is also suffering under the severe cold-wave. Notwithstanding the snow and cold weather, reports reaching Paris from the provinces say that large crowds attended the ceremonies held on Saturday to honour those who died on the battle-field. In the larger cities numerous associations of wounded veterans participated in the exercises.

New York, Nov. 4th.—Foisting of prohibition on the United States was a blunder charged with danger and loaded with disastrous probabilities, declared Mr. Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labour, in discussing last night its probable relation to unrest among working men in some parts of the country. "By adopting prohibition," he said, "we are weakening the social and economic fabric of the country. We have invaded the habits of the workingman, and thus what has happened? We have upset the man, unsettled him. Uprooting one habit uproots others", Mr. Gompers asserted, "the man who formerly was content to go home at night to converse and read, has become discontent and restive. He now goes into the streets and meets other men restless and unsettled like himself. They rub together their mutual grievances and there are sparks and sometimes fire, I believe Bolshevism in Russia began in prohibition."

New York, Nov. 3rd.—Federal Food Administrator, Mr. Williams, announced tonight that he had discovered 13,400,000 pounds of raw sugar on ships in the harbour, 1,000 tons of which had been offered for sale by a Wall Street broker
