**LIEUTENANT HORAN BIBS  
GOOD BYE.**

The Ten Penetential Days which began at New Year (Roshashana) 5682 terminated last evening with the solemn services of Yom Kipur, the Day of Atonement.

The services began at 6.30 sharp with the prayer Shimang Koli after which the five books of the Mosaic Law were taken from the Ark and conveyed in solemn procession to the reading desk. Immediately after prayers were offered for the President and officials of the United States government.

Then the evening confessions took

place, the Reader chanting and the congregation responding, with brief pauses for meditation. This part of the service was exceedingly impressive, and our thoughts wandered back to the days of old, when the Jewish community was numerous, and recalling the Fidanques, and Delvalles and Morons and others, we were reminded of what an important part the Hebrews had been and still are in our social and commercial life; how the withering of their numbers meant the decadence of our culture and business.

The Confessions being over, the Reader (Hazan) M. D. Sasso delivered a soul stirring exhortation. Taking his text from Leviticus, Chap. XXIII, vs 26 to 32, he explained the great significance of the day, which he claimed to be the most sacred of the ritual. In brief, but chosen language, he expounded his theme from dogmatic and philosophical standpoints, demonstrating thus a deep study of the Israelitish faith. Exhorting the congregation to be steadfast in the observance of religious precepts, he reminded them that true happiness can only be found in fulfilling the Divine commandments. He further pointed out that the Mosaic Law, the basis of all jurisprudence, is the same vital force today, radiating its beneficial effects every where, just as it was in the time of Moses.

The services closed with the chanting of the Thirteen Attributes of the Israelitish faith (Yigdal)

We trust that the Lord has received their prayer and fasting, remitted their sins and written their names in the Book of Life.—*Ibid.*
