NATIONAL ANTHEM.

Public Meeting to oppose Sanitary Measures a Fiasco.

The mass meeting in the theatre last night was graced by a large representative gathering comprising respectable people and including the working classes made up of fishermen, bread and cake-makers and others. The meeting was formally opened at 9 o'clock by Mr. James Roberts, piano-tuner, who briefly

explained the object for which it had been convened and called upon the house to nominate and elect a chairman. Proposed were Messrs. J. J. Johnson, Alexander Creagh, Fred. Jackson, Jr. and others who all declined, as did also Mr. B. R. Larsen and Mr. G. Lange who showed good reason why they could not take the chair. Lawyer A. E. Stake-mann who had promised to speak was present, and Dr. Canegata arrived later, but the other speakers as well as persons expected to come forward were conspicuously absent. As business could not be proceeded with until the necessary preliminaries had been disposed of the gathering was obliged to disperse after an hour or more had been wasted in abortive efforts to make a start. It was decidedly a great disappointment to those parties immediately interested who had relied upon their cause being championed by the more lettered and capable in the audience, and there is no gainsaying the fact that last night's proceedings stand out very discreditably against the better informed element of the community among whom are many so-called representatives of the people, who were probably shaking in their shoes from cold feet, and upon whom the responsibility should be placed for every hardship that may result through lack of appropriate representation and timely action in their behalf.

St. Thomas News.

We notice a general decline in the prices of foodstuff in some of the groceries. Rice a staple article can be bought at 10 cents per pound; potatoes five cents per pound and sugar 14 cents per pound. This much needed commodity—sugar—is bound to go very low as the holders of sugar abroad are selling it at a reduced price.—*St. Thomas Bulletin, Oct. 22nd.*
