Help Wanted!

The Red Cross Sewing Committee asks your help in two ways.

If you can come regularly to help sew for the destitute here and abroad, please come to the Red Cross Office at three o'clock on Tuesday, May 17. Plans will then be made for regular meetings for the purpose.

If you have partly worn garments which can be cut over for children, please send them to the office or telephone for them to be called for. Only clean garments should be sent. Clothing suitable for use in devastated Europe will be made over for this purpose, as the Christiansted Branch is desirous of doing its part to help the Red Cross carry out its pledge of 250 million garments for the naked and suffering children of Central Europe. Clothing which is only suitable for tropical wear will be made over for use here, and distributed through the hospitals, etc.

Please look over your wardrobe and send in what you can spare at once. If desired, it will be called for. The lower part of a man's shirt will make a little dress for a child; trousers can be cut over for the boys; never mind if things are faded so long as they are clean and not too tender to be made over.

Here is your chance to help the Red Cross. Spare an afternoon once a week; or send some garments to be salvaged for those who need them.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, May 10th.—Following is the result of the New Market stakes: 1st Lemonora, 2nd Eaglehawk, 3rd Franklin.

London, May 11th.—Germany's unconditional acceptance of the Entente reparations terms was delivered to Mr. Lloyd by Dr. Stamer, German Minister to Great Britain, here today.

Paris, May 11th.—Newspapers of this city this morning see in Germany's acceptance of the Allied reparations demands proof that Germany complies only to the argument of force. At the same time they express doubt as to her fulfilment of her undertaking.

London, May 11th.—It is reported that negotiations between the inter-allied commission in upper Silesia and Adalbert Kordanty, leader of the Polish insurgents in that area, resulted last evening in the suspension of hostilities, says a despatch to the central news from Warsaw today.

London, May 11th.—Further indications of the seriousness of the coal shortage caused by the miners' strike since April 1st, is furnished by the announcement that the vickers ship building and engineering works at Barrow, the largest concern in the United Kingdom, employing 150,000 men, will be forced to close
