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of flour. The despatch stated that the revenues of the Czechoslovak Govt. for the first nine months of 1920 were 41 per cent greater than the budget estimates, and 85 percent above the receipts for the same period in 1919. The ministry of trade and commerce at Prague is reported to be negotiating with private British interests for an extension of credit amounting to £25,000,000 for the development of rail and river transportation.

Paris, Feb. 22nd.—A despatch from Teheran, Persia, to the "Temps" today says 2,000 Persian Cossacks, commanded by General Rezakhan, coming from Kasvin, entered Teheran, the capital, on the night of February 20th-21st without meeting any opposition. They captured the public buildings and administrative offices, removing the Cabinet of Sepahdarazam from power. Rezkhan issued a proclamation guaranteeing the security of foreigners. He is conferring with the Shah for the purpose of forming a new Cabinet.

London, Feb. 23rd.—The consideration of Near Eastern questions by Allied and Turkish delegates began here this morning at 11.05 o'clock. The Turkish representatives entered the conference in two separate and distinct bodies, the Turkish nationalists envoys having refused to join the delegates of the Sultan's Govt. The conference was held in Queen Anne's drawing room of St. James Palace, instead of in the picture gallery, as was intended, the delegates assembling at a great horse shoe table in the centre of the apartment. Mr. Lloyd George sat on the left side of the horse shoe, with F. Briand of France and Count Sforza, Foreign Minister of Italy. On the other side of the table, sat Earl Curzon, the Japanese delegates being seated on his right. The Turkish representatives were given a separate table, Tewfik Pasha, representative of the Sultan's Government, looked feeble and ill when he was assisted into the room by the members of his staff. Bekir Samy Bey, head of the Turkish nationalist delegation, accompanied by his colleagues and a secretary, entered the room after Tewfik Pasha.

London Feb 23rd.—Viscount Grey at a dinner given in his honour by the National Liberal Club last night said he was one of those who believed there would be little pleasure or interest in living in the world if there was war between Great Britain and the United States. The fact was plain to him that there would not be cordiality between the two countries so long as the Irish question remained unsettled. He referred to the Anglo-American and added that he did not believe the two great democracies would ever go to war if the treaty was obeyed. Viscount Grey regretted that the people of the United

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States seemed very conscious of the Anglo-Japanese alliance, but appeared to be unaware of the Anglo-American peace pact which was still in force.
