weekly visit to Christiansted on Sunday  
afternoon, landed a few packages, and  
passengers, and sailed for Porto Rico via  
Frederiksted in the evening.

day. It is expected that the Tadousac  
will give her a tow out the harbor.

The Colonia' Council convened yester-  
day as per previous announcement, but  
it being a legal holiday on which it is  
understood that no legal business could  
be transacted, the meeting adjourned  
and an informal discussion of the items  
on the order of the day followed, the  
principal subject being the additional

money grant for the Kingshill Poor  
Farm, bill introduced by Government.  
The Acting Government Secretary and  
the Despatching Secretary were present,  
and a full assembly of Council members.  
The postponed meeting will be held on  
Monday.

The U. S. tug Tadousac with the Act-  
ing Government Secretary Clarke and  
some other passengers arrived here  
yesterday forenoon and will sail for St.  
Thomas this afternoon.

The Native Brass Band entertained an  
enthusiastic gathering with a concert of  
fine selections on Sunday evening after  
church service.

The Creole with mails for St. Thomas,  
Porto Rico, and the States sailed from  
this port at 6 p. m. yesterday.
