Court News

November 9th 1920.

Before His Honor, Lucius J. M. Malmin, Judge of the District Court of the Virgin Islands, in the Sub-Judicial District of Frederiksted this morning, in the case of the People versus George Reginald Richards, the defendant pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary in the second degree and was given six months in the Penitentiary less thirty-four days already spent in jail awaiting trial.

The defendant Richards broke into a house belonging to the Bethlehem concern and stole therefrom a pair of shoes and other personal property.

In the case of People versus Ernest Eastman, a native of Barbados, for burglary in the second degree, the defendant was given two years less thirty-seven days already spent in jail awaiting sentence.

The defendant stole sixty-five dollars the savings of a family in his vicinity.

The case against Henry Petersen and Christiana Joseph for adultery was dismissed and the Court adjourned for the term at Frederiksted.

A man arrested for rape on a six year old girl at Kingshill escaped from that jail last night, but was reapprehended this morning.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Nov. 4th.—Application for membership in the League of Nations will be made at the meeting of the Assembly of the League in Geneva this month on behalf, not only of Germany, but of Austria, according to information here. Bulgaria, it is learned, will also make application.

Constantinople, Nov. 4th.—General Wrangel has personally taken charge of a violent rear-guard cavalry action and cut to pieces two divisions of Red cavalry northwest of Salkova, according to advices received here. His position is reported to be improving with the chance of affecting a successful retreat for the main body of his troops.

London, Nov. 4th.—Further advances by the Bolshevik forces in their offensive against General Wrangel's troops in South Russia are reported in Wednesday's official statement from the Soviet War Office in Moscow. It reads, "In the Crimean sector we are continuing to drive back the enemy who is retiring to the Peninsula fighting fiercely."

New York, Nov. 5th.—With the size of President Elect Harding's electoral vote virtually settled at 404, out of a possible 531, and the completion of the new Senate set down as 59 Republicans and 37 Democrats, Republican leaders today awaited belated returns on eight contests in six states to fix the exact size of the Republican House majority. Exclusive of the eight undetermined seats in the Lower House, the Republicans had 286 members to 137 Democrats and four of other designations, a plurality of 149, the greatest ever held by any party in the House. The nearest approach to it was in the 52nd Congress, when the Democrats had a lead of 148.

New York, Nov. 4th.—Both raw and refined sugar displayed an easier tone yesterday. During the morning the American announced a cut of 1c. per pound to 11c. less 2% for cash, which followed the decline on Monday to 10.50c. by Arbuckle Bros.

Washington, Nov. 5th.—President Wilson today directed Secretary Daniels to place a battleship at the disposal of President elect Harding for his contemplated visit to the Panama Canal Zone. The President also instructed Mr. Daniels to offer the presidential yacht "May Flower" to convey him and his party to Hampton Roads to board the battleship.

Marion, Nov. 5th.—The offer of a battleship was declined by Mr. Harding, who wired that although he was thankful for Mr. Wilson's courtesy, he had already perfected his plans for the trip and had engaged a passage south from a Gulf port on a passenger steamer.

Dublin, Nov. 5th.—The Irish Peace Conference, which is an association of moderate Irish men of all parties, seeking to solve the Home Rule problem, has

written another letter to Mr. Lloyd George, expressing the view that the situation has been materially changed by the Premier's latest pronouncement of the Government's policy and announcing the construction of the Conference, that Parliament as now constituted does not sufficiently represent the Irish people to frame an acceptable constitution for Ireland. It is suggested by the Conference that Parliament should establish a constituent assembly elected on the parliamentary franchise on the basis of proportional representation and that Ireland be given complete financial independence.

London, Nov. 5th.—In a speech at Cardiff, Mr. Asquith declared that evidence that servants of the Crown were being allowed with virtually impunity to engage in a campaign of outrage, was overwhelming and irresistible. An appeal to Parliament, he said, was useless. Alluding to statements attributed to him as advocating a separate navy for Ireland, he explained that Ireland should not have anything not granted the great dominions and he would make it an absolute condition that the Imperial Navy should always have free access to all Irish ports. Should Ireland be ill-advised enough to start her own navy, it must be under conditions agreed to by all dominions at an imperial conference.

Constantinople, Nov. 5th.—The French have occupied the Bagdad railway north of Adana as far as Bozaneti.

Paris, Nov. 4th.—Further despatch confirming the extreme gravity of the position of General Wrangel, have been received by the Foreign Office, but are being withheld temporarily, in consequence of the capture by the Bolshevik of Perekop and the surrounding territory, regarded as the key to the isthmus. Fears are now expressed in French official circles that Genl. Wrangel's very existence in the Crimea may be seriously endangered. It is reliably reported that Genl. Wrangel has sent an urgent appeal to France and other allied powers, telling of the critical situation confronting him and requesting more aid.

Paris, Nov. 5th.—Great Britain, France and Italy have signed a tripartite agreement, in which they undertake to support each other in making the "spheres of influence" in Turkey. The limits of the areas which the respective special interests of France and Italy are recognized, are defined by the document. This agreement was signed at Sevres on August 10th, the day the public ceremonial of the signing of the peace treaty with Turkey took place. Although the agreement, it is explained is not considered a secret one, it has nevertheless never been made public until now, a lapse of nearly three months since the signing. Under its own terms the document is to come into force and be published at the time the Turkish peace treaty should go into effect.
