HIS EXCELLENCY GOVERNOR PHILIP WILLIAMS IN ST. CROIX—U. S. MARINES THROWING STONES IN CIVILIAN'S HOME.—LITTLE BOY RECEIVED WOUND.—POLICE MAN INNIS HELD UP MARINES—CONSTERNATION CAUSED BY PURSUIT OF MARINES ON THE WHARF WHILE CITIZENS LISTENED TO CONCERT BY INDUSTRIAL BAND.

On Sunday May 18-1924 the "Grebe" arrived in Christiansted with His Excellency Governor Philip Williams and a bunch of U. S. Marines.

During the said evening, about fifteen Marines (supposed to be the late arrivals) were raising "HELL" as they call it around the streets throwing stones in peaceful inhabitants homes causing bloodshed by chopping a little boy with a stone.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Hong Kong, May 16th.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, President of the South China Government, whose death was reported to have occurred on Tuesday is alive and is perfectly well, his confidential secretary declared emphatically today to a representative of the Associated Press sent from Hong Kong to Sun's Canton Headquarters. On being assured that the Southern China's leader still is alive, the correspondent requested an interview with him. "Dr. Sun the Secretary added is perfectly well, after an indisposition that could not be termed illness." However the opinion still prevails in Hong Kong that if the constitutional party chief is not dead, he at least is suffering from a severe breakdown. It is said that his condition is such that none but members of his family are permitted to see him.
