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TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Lucerne, Sept. 5th.—The visit of Mr. Lloyd George to Lucerne ended today. Accompanied by his suite of 24 persons the Premier left on a special train at 10.30 o'clock this morning for Zermat.

Philadelphia, Sept. 5th.—Fine batting by the Incognito Cricket Team gave the British visitors an easy victory over the Philadelphia Cricket Club on Saturday. After the Philadelphians had put together 255 runs in the first innings, the English players amassed a total of 406. Of this total G. O. Helmer contributed 143 and Capt. Burrows 97. The Philadelphians in their second innings scored only 120, giving the visitors the match without taking a second innings.

Jerusalem, Sept. 5th.—The Jewish Assembly in Palestine will be opened on October 7th, it was officially announced today. The main object of the gathering of Jewish representatives from all parts of Palestine will be the election of an independent executive composed of Philistines and Jews to replace the present Zionist Commission.

London, Sept. 5th.—The British American Athletic met at the Queen's Club on Saturday with Olympic stars of each nation in competition ended in a tie of 5 events to England and five to the United States.

London, Sept. 5th.—In connection with the Trades Union meeting here tomorrow the Council of Action met today and decided to send Mr. William Adamson and Mr. A. Purcell, as the council's delegates to Riga to attend the Russo-Polish Conference. This determination was reached in view of the appeal of the Socialist Labour Party at Poland that steps

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be taken by the British labour movement looking for an understanding of the Polish case.

Paris, Sept. 4th.—The French Government made known yesterday that the Germans had delivered 1,500,000 tons of coal to August 28th, and said it was estimated that the total deliveries for the month exceeded 1,600,000 tons. This would be 400,000 tons below the deliveries promised by the Germans at Spa, the Government's statement said that the rate of increase in production indicated that the Germans might in September and October make up the deficiency and reach the required 6,000,000 tons, for the quarter.

Berlin, Sept. 4th The Zeitung Ammitag learns that Germany's coal deliveries to the Allies during August fully complied with the requirements of the Spa agreement. The newspaper also asserts that the full amount during September is already assured. Difficulties will be experienced in meeting requirements for October, says the Journal, owing to the recent disorders in Upper Silesia and a strike among the Polish miners.

New York, Sept. 2nd.—The feature of the day in sugar was a rumour circulating in the trade that a power Wall Street sugar refining company which had bought heavily in Java whites for the local market had diverted upwards of 50,000 tons of this sugar to European countries, Holland and elsewhere. Such a move, it was thought, would help the unsettled situation to some extent. There was no reported change in refiners list prices which now range from 16c. to 17.10c., less 2% for cash, the demand continuing light and mostly supplied from

second hand offerings, the supply from this source possibly being now fairly well depleted. There was further inquiry in the market for refined export and it was believed that negotiations were underway looking for additional business. In raw sugars no new business was reported. An operator was said to be still bidding for Cuban raws at 10½c. C. and F. but holders have apparently stiffened their ideas and expect to hold for a 15c. market. Practically all raw sugar here have been placed in store or on lighters. Full duty sugars were said to be available in small lots at from 10c to 10½ C. I. F. with Porto Ricos probably available at 11½ C. I. F. 20,000 bags of the latter being now on lighters though pressed for sale at the moment. The sugar futures market opened 12 points lower on September. Other months unchanged to an advance of 25 points. Business was very quiet until late in the day when outside interests started a covering movement which sent prices sharply upwards closing at net gains of 20 to 70 points.
