

Notice To The Public

SANITARY RULES

regarding the sale of bread, cakes, pies, pastries and candies in the towns of Christiansted and Frederiksted, Municipality of St. Croix.

UNDER the provision of paragraph 28, Sanitary Regulations for the towns of Christiansted and Frederiksted, Municipality of St. Croix, of January 30, 1886 authorizing the Board of Health to control the sale of provisions and by the authority placed in the Chief Sanitation Officer by the Governor to assume the functions of the Board of Health, the following measures are hereby set forth to take effect November 1st, 1920:

Bread, cakes, pies, pastries and candies offered for sale or kept for the purpose of being sold must be protected from flies, dirt and dust at all times.

—All persons engaged in making bread, cakes, pies, pastries and candies for sale, must do so in room so screened that is absolutely fly-proof, such room not to be used as a bed-room, living room, or for any purpose other than the making of bread, pies, cakes, pastries and candies.

It is forbidden to allow dogs, cats, chickens, ducks and all other animals in any room used for the purpose of making bread, cakes, pies, pastries and candies.

All persons engaged in the preparation, handling or sale of such provisions as enumerated above, must be free from disease, wear clean clothes and have clean hands, including clean finger nails.

All shops, stores and stands keeping any of the above enumerated provisions for sale must do so in a screened container that is absolutely fly-proof.

All provisions as enumerated above not prepared, kept or sold in accordance with the above rules will be considered as injurious to health and will be destroyed as provided for in paragraph 28 of the Sanitary Regulations for the towns of Christiansted and Frederiksted, Municipality of St. Croix of January 30, 1886.

LOCAL.

With reference to a news item published some days ago to the effect that the Electric Co. had secured an engine from the Bethlehem concern, it is now further advised that the intention to make use of that engine had to be abandoned as it was found that the engine would not fully suit the work. Mr. Fabio now informs us that a new engine has been cabled for and is expected to go forward by earliest opportunity. During the time before it arrives every effort will be made to supply all available current. The street lights were turned on since Wednesday night.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

London, Oct. 5th. —Mr. Lloyd George will speak at Llanelly on Friday and it is expected he will deal at length with the Irish question. He will probably analyse Viscount Grey's proposals for a settlement and also Mr. Asquith's which appears in a letter to the Times this morning. The latter's suggestion, granting Ireland the status of an autonomous dominion in the fullest and widest sense, is received with general skepticism. The Evering Standard wholeheartedly a coalition organ, endorses what it alleges is being said generally in political circles today, namely that it would be the most absolute surrender to violence on record, and concludes with the half suggestion that the Liberals may possibly repudiate the Asquith's leadership, or there may be a permanent split in their ranks, equal in effect to that following Mr. Gladstone's conversion to Home Rule. The Westminster Gazette which usually gives its benediction to Mr. Asquith's sentiments, treats his latest proposal tonight with merely distant respect, harking back to its own earlier announcement that the Irish people have suffered a total loss of faith in the seriousness and honesty of purpose of the British Government. It supports Viscount Grey's proposal to leave Irishmen the responsibility of finding the right solution of the Irish question, and says: "We share his confidence that, if they can be set to work on it in a responsible manner, many of the difficulties which now loom largest will disappear."

Warsaw, Oct. 4th. —War and peace plans progressed simultaneously yesterday under the same roof in recently re-occupied Polish territory where General Pilsudski, the head of the State, has established his temporary headquarters. In one room of the House where the General is domiciled, plans were laid for continuing in pursuit of the defeated Soviet troops on the northern front who are fleeing in a disordered retreat. In another room civilian representatives of the Government were received by the chief for discussion of the next move to be made by the Poles at the Riga Peace Conference with the Russians. On the Polish front it was announced that the cavalry pursuing the Russians had reached a point less than 45 miles from Minsk. In various sectors the Bolsheviki were reported near the point of collapse. In one sector an entire brigade was taken prisoner virtually without a fight, the account declares. In the Pripet region after some fighting the Poles captured 12,000 Russians. In the South General Romer's cavalry was reported to be making some progress.

London, Oct. 4th. —Canada is the favorite Dominion among British emigrants, according to an announcement by
