## TELEGRAMS

### ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Nov. 19th.—The enthusiasm with which New York welcomed the Prince of Wales showed no signs of abatement today. The crowds who jammed the downtown streets when the Royal visitor started on his sight-seeing, through the financial districts, were even denser than those which greeted him on his arrival yesterday and a bitter north-wind failed to discharge the hundreds of thousands who waited patiently for hours to catch a glimpse of the Prince. Everywhere he went huge crowds cheered him to the echo, giving him a reception as even New York has rarely if ever witnessed before.

New York, Nov. 19th.—The first event of the day was a review of British war veterans who were assembled at the Colombia Yacht Club when the Prince landed from the battle cruiser "Renown". Companies of the 71st Regiment of the New York State Guard acted as an escort of honour to the British veterans, who were dressed in the uniforms of some of the most famous regiments in the British army. The Prince's next visit was paid to the Woolworth Building, where from a height of 700 feet, he had a bird's-eye view of the city, returning to earth the Prince was escorted to Trinity Church, where his grandfather worshipped 60 years ago. He was welcomed by the Rector, the Rev. William T. Manning, and the members of the Vestry. The Prince occupied the same pew in which his grandfather had sat two generations before. In a brief address Rev. Manning welcomed him as the representative of the "Great free Empire of Britain, which has borne so glorious a part in the world war and with

whose sons our own fought side by side for right and freedom." The ceremony closed with a prayer that all the peoples of English speech may live ever in close fellowship, not for their own selfish advantage, but for the maintenance of justice, liberty and peace in all the earth. On leaving the Church, the Prince visited in turn the Stock Exchange, the Sub-treasury and the Produce Exchange.

Washington, Nov. 20th—President Wilson today appointed a new Industrial Conference and called it into session on December 1st. the conference will be composed of 17 men, including Government officials, business men, former members of the Cabinet and former Governors of States, and it will carry on the work undertaken by the National Industrial Conference, which floundered on the rock of collective bargaining.
