TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin, Sept. 4th.—Germany has arrived at the end of her tether so far as her further ability to finance passive resistance is concerned. This is the current impression in banking circles, which expect that Germany in the course of the next few days will take the initiative in the direction of proposing that official discussion be begun with the French and Belgian Governments.

Paris, Sept. 5th.—The Ambassador to Japan, M. Paul Claudid, is safe aboard the steamship Andre Lebon, the Foreign Office was notified in a cable message from the French Consul at Kobe. The Councillor of the Embassy has arrived at Kobe aboard the President Jefferson.

London, Sept 5th.—London fully respected the wishes of the Prince of Wales on his departure this morning on his Canadian holiday and there was no demonstration either on the streets or at the railway station.

Athens, Sept. 5th.—Three shepherds who were near the scene of the murder of the five Italian members of the Greco-Albanian Boundary Commission have been arrested. One of the men is said to have seen the actual killing of the Italians. The other two saw Albanians answering descriptions of the murderers given by the eye witnesses crossing the

Albanian frontier. The Greek Government has offered a reward of 1,000,000 drachmas for information leading to the arrest of the murderers.

Geneva, Sept. 4th.—Italy today challenged the right of the League of Nations to intervene in the Greco-Italian dispute, when her spokesman declared that the conflict belonged solely to the domain of the inter-Allied Council of Ambassadors, and did not fall within the competency of the League. This announcement created an immense irritation in the council chamber, which was crowded. After a reply from M Politis, ex-Greek Foreign Minister, upholding the attitude of his Government, Lord Robert Cecil, of Great Britain, added a further sensation by insisting that articles 10, 12, and 15 of the covenant of the League of Nations should be read immediately, both in French and in English, and by declaring that if these articles were to be disregarded, the whole settlement of Europe would be shaken. The articles in question were cited by Greece as the basis of her appeal to the League and stipulated that the Council of the League has a clear right to an investigation when there is danger of rupture between any of the states which are members of the League. Further discussion of the Greco-Italian crisis was adjourned to an unfixed date, in order to give the members of the council an opportunity to examine the Italian declaration and decide upon their future attitude in the crisis, which is generally regarded as having been aggravated by signor Salandra's pronouncement.

New York, Sept. 5th.—While a blow apparently has been struck at the silk industry of Japan in the districts destroyed by the earthquake, a great impetus was given to American steel and lumber export business, it was declared today in the Journal of Commerce. Already there promises a speedy restoration of the ruined areas as indicated by the many inquiries for building materials, principally for galvanized sheets, wire nails, wire rods, reinforcing bars and structural steel. Galvanized sheets are used in Japan mostly for roofing, recent Japanese legislation forbidding the use of bamboo for that purpose.

San Francisco, S. pt. 5th.—Cable orders from Kobe, Japan, for approximately 500,000,000 feet of lumber for use in the rebuilding of Yokohama, Tokio and other Japanese cities laid waste by earthquake and fire, were received here yesterday.

Brussels, Sept. 5th.—The Belgian Consul at Kobe has telegraphed to the Foreign Office here that Kobe is intact, but is without communication with the rest of Japan.

Rome, Sept. 5th.—The Minister of Marine yesterday ordered an Italian cruiser at Shanghai to proceed immediately to the affected districts of Japan to give every possible assistance.
