## TELEGRAMS

### ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Dusseldorf, May 5th.—The Reichwehr and Police yesterday attacked a number of Red Guards to the South of this city and dispersed them.

Hamburg, May 5th.—In the course of a meeting, attended by several thousand persons, Herr Helferich exposed the programme of the conservative party, whose sole object is the revision of the treaty of Versailles. He declared that the hour had come to resist the extravagant pretensions of France which is henceforth isolated and ruined.

San Remo, April 24th.—Mr. Lloyd George has been deluged with telegrams from every Zionist organization in the world, pointing out the anxiety caused by the present protracted delay in settling the future of the Holy Land urging the Supreme Council to confer on Great Britain the mandate provided by the League of Nations for Palestine.

Montreal, April 24th.—Notices were sent out yesterday by all the United States railways regarding the sending of goods to Canada, stating that on and after May first next all consignments for Canada must be paid in U. S. currency. This means an advance of about ten per cent on all goods imported from the U. S. into Canada.

Montreal, April 24th.—A preliminary list of representatives, who will attend the Imperial Press Conference in Canada this Summer; has been received by Mr. Randal, Honorary Secretary to the Executive Committee of the Canadian Press Association. There will be thirty-one delegates from Great Britain and 21 from the Dominions. The main body of

the visitors will sail from England on the "Victorian" and will arrive at Halifax on July 25th. Seven of the Australian Delegates will come via Vancouver. The conference will be held at Ottawa on August 5th, 6th, and 7th, the delegates will tour Canada from coast to coast, ending at Quebec about September 15th. Among those coming are Viscount and Lady Burnham, Viscount Northcliffe, Lord Riddell, Sir Roderick Jones, managing director of "Reuter's Agency", Lord Apsley of the "Morning Post", Sir Wesley Carr of the "News of the World", Sir Frank Newnes, Sir Harry Brittain, Mr. Blumenfeld of the "Daily Express", Mr. Powell of the "Financial News", Mr. Watson of the "Westminster Gazette", Mr. Donald representing the "Globe", "Yorkshire Observer" and other publications, and proprietors and representatives of Sheffield, Wolverhampton, Liverpool, Glasgow, Aberdeen, Leicester and Dublin papers.

Constantinople, April 24th.—Five hundred French troops are reported to have been wiped out in the course of the evacuation of Urfa in the north-western part of Mesopotamia.

St. Thomas, May 7th.—General Pershing arrived here at 8 o'clock this morning on U. S. S. "Northern Pacific" and was accorded the usual honours on landing. After a stay on shore of two hours he returned on board and sailed for San Juan, P. R., 10.30 a. m.

Paris, April 24th.—M. Jonnart, ex-Foreign Minister, has been appointed Ambassador Extraordinary to the Vatican. When many questions between France and the Holy See resulting from

years, have been disposed of by M. Jonnart, a permanent Ambassador will probably be named.

London, April 24th.—Avon Villa today won the English football cup from Sunderland at the grounds of that Club by a score of one to nil extra time had to be played, the winning score being made by Kirton. The attendance is given as fifty thousand. Hull won the Northern Union Rugby final today from Huddersfield by a score of three points to one.

Jerusalem, April 24th.—The British Commander here has confirmed the sentences passed by court martial, mainly under the Ottoman Penal Code, on several Arabs and Jews connected with recent rioting. The sentences range from fifteen years imprisonment downwards. The Jews kept their shops closed on Tuesday morning in protest, but reopened them on the Government's order. The total casualties in the rioting is announced as 198.

London, April 25th.—Nearly two thousand blind men, the majority of them the wreckage of war, were concentrated in London today, forming probably the most pathetic and tragic procession ever seen in the streets of the city. For nearly three weeks sightless bands have been wending their weary way on foot for all parts of the United Kingdom and Ireland. Enroute they held meetings in various parts of the country and succeeded in stirring widespread sympathy. The object of their pilgrimage is to call attention to the failure of the Government to provide proper legislation for dealing adequately with the problem of the blind. Some of the marchers were so exhausted that they had to be helped along the last part of their journey miles of people welcomed them one demonstrative woman breaking through the crowd and hugging men, crying, "cheer up, we will soon end this disgrace".

New York, April 26th.—The American Sugar Refining Company announced today that it had advanced the price for the bulk of granulated sugar from seventeen and a half cents per pound to eighteen and a half cents, the whole sale prices for sugar now vary from seventeen and a half cents to twenty-three and a half cents per pound. Since last December the price of Cuban raw sugar has advanced from ten cents, cost and freight to eighteen and a half cents.

Paris, May 5th.—At a meeting this afternoon the metal workers in the Paris region adopted a motion for a general strike.
