ST. CROIX STATION.

Philadelphia, April 29th.—Great Britain, represented by Oxford University, failed on Saturday in a gallant attempt to capture for a second time the two mile college relay championship of the United States, but the British quartette forced an even more brilliant Pennsylvania State team to set a new World record to win. It was the outstanding event on the days card of the 29th annual University of Pennsylvania relay carnival. Allan Nich, National half mile champion, running the last relay for Pennsylvania state, broke the tape nearly thirty yards ahead of Milligan, the Oxford captain, 7 minutes 48 3/5 seconds, bettering by 3/5 of a second the former World's record, established at last years Pennsylvania meet. Three years ago a combined Oxford-Cambridge team won the event. Hamilton College Institute, of Canada, scored an international victory in the two-mile championship for both high and preparatory schools runners.

Ottawa, April 29th.—Two further changes in the King cabinet have been announced. Mr. George Graham was confirmed in the position of Minister of Railways and Mr. E. M. Mac Donald was made acting Minister of Militia and Defence, the duties of which department he has been carrying on since he entered the Government. No more Cabinet appointments will be made until after the close of the session, when the filling of the Solicitor Generalship, made vacant by the resignation of Judge D. D. Mac

Kenzie, and the portfolio of immigration and colonization of which Mr. Charles Stewart has been acting minister, will be considered. It is definitely known that Mr. A. K. Mac Lean will be appointed to the vacancy on the Ex-chequer court at the end of the present session of Parliament.

Dublin, April 29th.—The signal tower of the great northern railway in Dublin was blown up today, as a train was leaving for Drogheda. The coaches of the train were struck by an avalanche of fragments of cement and 17 passengers were injured by flying debris and broken glass. When the explosion took place fire was opened on the station guard. Today two men in a taxicab drove in a suburb and held up a constable and threw a bomb into a drygoods shop, wrecking it. Several employees living in the rear of the store were injured. The whole district in which the store is situated was shaken by the detonation.

Berlin, April 30th.—Flushed with the large part it has played in blocking the efforts of the French and the Belgians in the occupation of the Ruhr, German labour is rallying with more vim than ever for the celebration of May day, as an international workingmans holiday. For nearly a year, the workers claim, nothing but an unarmed army of labourers has successfully withstood the attempts of tens of thousands of soldiers to achieve fruitful results in the occupation of Europe's leading industrial district. The labourers believe that this battle had been unique in the annals of history.

Munich, April 30th.—May day is filled with possibilities of disorder in Bavaria, in the face of latest advices, although the Bavarian Government has forbidden the trades unions and the radicals to hold demonstrations in Munich on that day. The Bavarian Government announces that it has discovered there are plans afoot in various parts of the state to use intensive terrorism in preventing labourers from working on May 1st. The official statement issued by Government, says the ministry of the interior has instructed the police authorities to "take measures necessary for guaranteeing protection to persons desiring to work, for the prevention of terroristic action.

Portland, Maine, April 30th.—Streams rising ten feet above their usual level, as the result of rains during the last two days, have flooded the valley in the mountainous and hilly districts of Maine

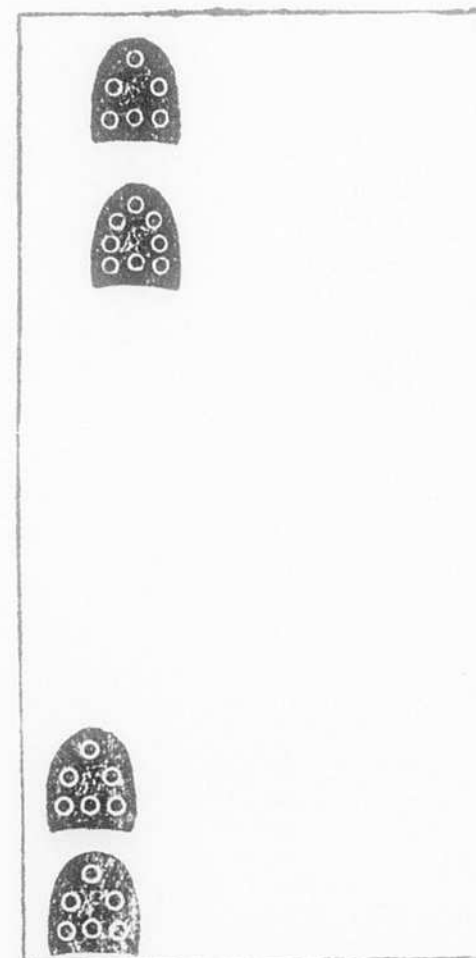
and New Hampshire and sent the farmers and towns-people scurrying to higher ground with their families and possessions for safety.
