EFFICIENT LEADERSHIP

On or about October 28, the St. Tho-
mas Labor Union was notified by the
Stevedoring Companies (West India Co.
Ltd. and E. A. Berne) that they had
proposed to make the following reduc-
tion in wages:

19 cents per hour for longshoremen
instead of 22 cents
time and a half instead of double
for overtime,
effective November 1.

On receipt of this communication,
President Moorehead of the St. Thomas
Labor Union held a meeting with his
officers, whereat it was resolved to ask
the companies for an extension of time
of one week, so that the Union would
be able to submit the matter to the
workers interested. While the general
sentiment at the meeting was favorable
to a reduction, nevertheless, the Board
thought that it was their duty to en-
deavor to obtain the best terms possible,
and further, in matters of such import-
ance, it would be unfair to the men to
decide anything without giving them
opportunity to be heard.

Following the usual proceedings in
such cases, the subject was accordingly
laid before the workers, and thus having
a proper basis for negotiations, Presi-
dent Moorehead requested a conference
with the companies. The meeting took
place at the office of the West India Co.
Ltd., at 10 a. m. Nov. 1. Present were
Commander Laub and Mr. Mylne of the
W. I. Co., Mr. Emile Berne, Pres.
Moorehead and two officers of the Union.

After considerable discussion, the con-
ference adjourned until November 4,
when the labor leaders met separately
with the Company and Mr. Berne at
their respective offices, and at 4 p. m.
of that day the final decision of

**TWENTY CENTS PER HOUR and

effective November 7, was reached.

The new arrangement was carried out
in discharging cargo from the Danish
M/S "Transvaal."
