TELEGRAMS.**ST. CROIX STATION.**

Buenos Ayres, March 2nd.—Schools have been closed in the city of Cordova, following the discovery of a number of cases of bubonic plague near there.

Athens, March 2nd.—Greece cannot accept the revision of the treaty of Sevres which she considers represents the minimum compensation for her services in the war and her efforts to establish peace in the Near East. This was the substance of a resolution unanimously adopted by the National Assembly last night which will be telegraphed to the Greek delegates in London for presentation to the Allies. The resolution expresses the nation's gratitude to the Allies for their traditional protection of its interests and closes with the hope that there will be no alteration of the treaty.

London, March 2nd. The Coalition party had a narrow escape from defeat in the East Woolwich by-elections to choose a successor to Mr. Crooks, retiring Labour member of Parliament. Capt. Glee, coalitionist was elected over Mr. Mac Donald, former chairman of the labour party who was the candidate of the independent labourites. The vote which was made public today was 13,724 to 13,040.

Constantinople, March 2nd.—Batum is being evacuated by Allies traders and bankers and by some refugees who reached that city from Tiflis. Russian Bolshevik troops in large numbers are invading Georgia from all directions, it is said in despatches received here.

Halifax, March, 3rd.—"The Canadian Fisher," which inaugurated the West Indies passenger service from Halifax in January, completed her first round trip and arrived at Halifax on Tuesday evening. The introduction of the Canadian Govt. Mercantile Marine to the passenger trade has proved decidedly successful, and from now a three-weeks service will be maintained from Halifax by the Canadian Fisher and Canadian Forester.

Panama, March 3rd.—Costa Rican forces are being rushed to the Isthmus district between this country and Costa Rica, where Panamanian and Costa Rican troops have been engaged in hostilities. Travellers arriving here from Costa Rica report anti-American demonstrations in San Jose, Puerto Limon, Cartago and Heredia on February 27th and 28th. A strict censorship has been established here and little is known of the movements of Panamanian volunteer forces.
