EDITORIAL.

With reference to the publication from the Sanitary Department respecting rules for making bread, cakes, etc., it may be stated that the control of this matter would be well extended also to the sale of provisions in groceries where the flies are often so thickly gathered on the sugar as to form a veritable curtain over the dish or other vessel in which sugar is kept for sale on the open

counters. This applies also to other lines of groceries such as lard and butter which articles are used for making bread and cakes, etc., and are often bought with dead flies in them. Inattention to this will, of course, have the same deleterious effects it is aimed at eliminating, and it is brought to the notice of those concerned, as is also the nasty practice of spitting about the floors of groceries which is a horrid business self-evidently condemnable.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Athens, Oct. 12th.—Only the vigorous constitution of King Alexander, according to the announcement of his physicians, can save him in the crisis of the illness from which he is suffering in consequence of the bite of a monkey. The bulletins published at the Palace state that the King has entered on the critical stage of his sickness. The Government is alarmed at his condition and a council of Ministers has met to consider the administration of the country in the event of his becoming worse. Although the King has been asked, he has made no definite statements with respect to the Government of Greece, although the gravity of his condition is not being concealed from him.

Brussels, Oct. 12th.—The Montenegrin Press Bureau states that an attempt was made to assassinate the Regent Alexander of Serbia during his visit to Bosnia, bombs being thrown at the train in which he was returning from Sarajevo, but without causing him any injury.

Riga, Oct. 12th.—The preliminary treaty of armistice and peace has been signed by the Russian and Polish delegates. The affixing of the signature of each of the delegates was commenced a little after seven o'clock this evening.

New York, Oct. 12th.—At League Park a boxing match between Georges Carpentier and Levinsky was won by the former in a formidable knockout in the fourth round.
