TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Washington, Oct. 12th.—Secretary Daniels has commended the commanding officers of the Atlantic and Pacific Fleets on their gunnery and engineering efficiency. For the last fiscal year the battleship division number five of the Atlantic Fleet, Rear Admiral Eberle commanding, made the best record in division gunnery of either fleet of superdreadnoughts. The Utah, Florida, Delaware and North Dakota comprised division five.

Athens, Oct. 13th.—The condition of King Alexander, is still critical.

Vera Cruz, Oct. 12th.—General Felix Diabar, ordered to be deported, sailed

last night on board the French steamer Flander for Havana. His ultimate destination is New Orleans. He was cheered by a crowd at the dock. He declared himself disgusted with the tactics the Government used against him.

Washington, Oct. 13th.—Representatives of agricultural interests are in conference here and are attempting to secure a more liberal Government policy. They expect a hearing tomorrow with the Federal Reserve Board. The farmers declare that they fear huge losses unless aid is extended.

Lafayette, Ind., Oct. 12th.—Governor Cox delivered sixteen speeches in Illinois and Indiana yesterday. He declared himself for the League of Nations heart and soul and charged Senator Harding with wiggling and wobbling on the League issue.

Buenos Aires, Oct. 12th.—The anniversary of the discovery of America was celebrated throughout the Spanish speaking countries of South America as a tribute to Spain. Parades, oratorical exercises, brilliant night illuminations and special literary functions were features of the celebration in this city.

Washington, Oct. 13th.—Reports of a revolution in the vicinity of San Cristobal, Venezuela, are unconfirmed.

Pine Bluff, Ark., Oct. 12th.—Fire last night swept away eight blocks of the coloured section of this city. Fifty houses were destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$100,000. Five hundred people are homeless.

Warsaw, Oct. 12th.—The Bolsheviks are concentrating on the Southern front and intend to attack the Ukrainians as soon as the Polish armistice signed yesterday becomes effective. The Russians have evacuated Kiev, and Ukrainian insurgents have occupied the city.

Riga, Oct. 13th.—The Bolshevik delegate on will leave for Warsaw on Saturday. No arrangement was made for a final peace conference, but it will likely take place at London or Paris.

London, Oct. 8th.—Great Britain has decided to take certain action against Soviet Russia if steps are not taken by October 10th for the release of the British prisoners held by the Bolsheviks, says the "Herald", which this morning prints what purports to be the text of notes exchanged by the British and Soviet Governments. In reply to this threat M. Krassin, head of the Russian Bolshevik Mission here, said on behalf of the Bolsheviks that they will promise to fulfill the conditions required by Great Britain when the latter carries out her part of the bargain made last July for the mutual release of all prisoners and the cessation of all hostilities.

London, Oct. 8th.—The coal situation in England was somewhat relieved today as the result of Mr. Smillie's statement urging the miners to accept the present
