TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Kingston, Jca. April 5th.—At the annual meeting of the Jamaica Imperial Association held yesterday, Mr. A. W. Langhaston spoke on the great value of the Agricultural College at Trinidad. He said that although Jamaica naturally felt a certain chagrin in not getting the college in this island, it would be of enormous advantage to the colony and he urged that Jamaica give an annual subsidy of five thousand pounds and that there should be a scheme of scholarships in connection with the college. He moved the following resolution, which was unanimously carried: "That the Jamaica Imperial Association, in general meeting assembled, strongly urges on the government the necessity in the interest of the island, of supporting the West Indian Agricultural College and this association hopes the Government of the island will see its way to endow scholarships for Jamaican boys, to help them to take advantage of the agricultural college in Trinidad".

Berlin, April 4th.—General Degoutte's ultimatum, threatening German railway workers with expulsion from the Ruhr, expired yesterday. Although the German workers in the various districts, including Treves, Mayence and Karlsruhe, unanimously refused to obey the French order, no counter measures have been taken.

Berlin, April 4th.—A Dortmund despatch to Der Tag reports heavy troop concentrations there since yesterday. The French have stationed a captive balloon at Dortmund also permitting close

Constantinople, April 4th.—Prohibition has gone into effect in Constantinople, under instructions issued by the Nationalist Government from Angora. After today any persons found drinking alcoholic beverages will receive thirty strokes with the bastinado, a long pliable stick. Foreigners and traders selling liquor are liable to a fine of fifty Turkish pounds.

London, April 4th.—The Prince of Wales successfully rode his horse "Little Favourite" to victory today in the Welsh Guards cup steeple chase, over a two and a half mile course, in the Household Brigade race at Hawthorne Hill. Only one other horse finished the course, of the five starters. The King and Queen were spectators.

Alexandria, La. April 4th.—The known dead in the tornado, which early tonight

struck Pineville and vicinity, across the Red River from Alexandria, reached 14 with the arrival here at ten o'clock tonight of a train bringing the bodies of eight persons killed at Pineville and at a sawmill settlement a mile east of that town. Fifty or more persons were reported injured. Search was being made tonight of the wrecked houses, in an area approximately a mile square in the Eastern section of Pineville, for the dead, injured and missing.
