TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, May 29th.—The Govt. is unprepared to make any proposals at present towards the extension of the Home Rule in India, it was announced by Mr. Clynes, Deputy Leader in the House of Commons, in answering a question this afternoon.

London, May 29th.—The partial support of the Govt. by the Liberals in the House of Commons was withdrawn last night when a proposed subjection in the unemployment insurance bill was introduced to extend the insurance of juveniles between the ages of 14 and 15 and it was killed by a vote of 353 to 3, even the Labour members failing to support it. All the authorities in the country on matters of education are against the propos-

al and consider that young people should remain at school until they are 16 years of age.

London, May 29th.—A statement made in the House of Commons today by Mr. Charles Ammon, Parliamentary Secretary to the Admiralty, in reply to a question that the Admiralty yacht "Enchantress" was to be put in commission again in ten days, in order to allow the Board of Admiralty officially to attend the review of the fleet in July and to inspect the ships, led to a torrent of question being asked. Mr. George Lansbury, Labour member, wanted to know why the Labour Government required a yacht which the coalition Government had laid aside. Mr. Ammon replied that it was not the Government but the Admiralty that required the yacht. He mentioned that the cost involved in recommissioning the "Enchantress" would be 700 pounds.

Ottawa, May 29th.—The Government's attitude in regard to the Treaty of Lausanne was further outlined in the Senate this afternoon by Senator Dandurand, leader of the Government, in reply to a question by Senator Griesbach. Senator Griesbach asked whether Canada was still at war with Turkey and if not by what act had the war been brought to a close. Senator Dandurand replied that Canada had entered on war with Turkey when war had been declared by His Majesty on Turkey, or by Turkey on His Majesty. A state of war had ceased to exist when His Majesty had ratified a treaty of peace with Turkey. "What treaty," ask Senator Griesbach, "that of Severs, or Lausanne." "The treaty which was ratified recently," replied the Government leader, and which is known as the Treaty of Lausanne.

London, May 29th.—Jack Bloomfield ex-heavy weight champion of Great Britain tonight knocked out Dick Smith in the fourth round of a 15 round bout in the Albert Hall, the Prince of Wales was present.

Paris, May 29th.—Uruguay today qualified for the quarter finals in the Olympic Soccer Football competition, by defeating the United States, 3 goals to two, in a match the score of which does not begin to show the difference in class between the two teams. In a duel between North America and South America for football supremacy of the world, the former was outplayed, out generalled, outrun and out scored. The other teams which qualified today were Sweden, which electrified the Olympic football world by defeating Belgium, one of the prime favourites in the tournament eight to 1, Egypt, which proved another giant killer by sending Hungary back with a 2 to nothing defeat, and Italy, which won from Luxemburg, two to nothing.
