PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

COLONIAL COUNCIL

FOR ST. CROIX.

At one-thirty o'clock p. m. on Monday, February 13, 1922, the Colonial Council for St. Croix held its Fifth Ordinary Meeting in the Council Hall in Christiansted.

All members were present.

Acting Government Secretary (Clarke) and Despatching Secretary (Rappolee) were present at the meeting.

The Council was opened with the following prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. H. M. Pigott:

Most gracious God, we humbly beseech Thee as for the people of this Island in general; so especially for their representatives in Council assembled, that Thou would'st be pleased to direct and prosper all their consultations to the glory and welfare of Thy people; that all things may be so ordered and settled by their endeavors upon the best and surest foundations, that peace and happiness, truth and justice, religion and piety, may be established among us all for generations.

This we humbly ask through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Chairman remarked: Honorable members, since the last meeting I have received a communication from the Governor in which he sends his best wishes to the Colonial Council for the new year, and the following reply has been sent through the Despatching Secretary: "Please convey to His Excellency the Governor the Colonial Council's reciprocation of his good wishes for 1922".

The minutes for the last meeting have been duly published in the "St. Croix Avis" and if there are no objections to make I will consider them tacitly adopted.

There being no objection, the Chairman declared the minutes as published tacitly adopted.

The Chairman then remarked, we will now proceed with the Order of the Day. Item 1. Production of copy of Minutes of the Municipal Committee for the quarter ending December 31, 1921, forwarded by the Chairman of the Committee for inspection of Members of the Council.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) remarked: Mr. Chairman before proceeding I would like to ask a question. Is the Colonial Council today in order to transact business on a legal holiday?

Acting Government Secretary (Clarke) in reply said: Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen, the holding of the meeting on this day is due to a misunderstanding between Mr. Rappolee and myself which we had over the wire. I understood that Lincoln's Birthday was not a legal holiday in the Virgin Islands and sent a radiogram saying that the Council would meet and that I would come over. I can find no law against holding the meeting today and I do not think it will be illegal to hold the meeting.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) remarked: Mr. Chairman, my reason for raising the question is this: Our holiday Ordinance states "Any day proclaimed a public holiday shall be a legal holiday for all purposes".

It seems to me as if we would be violating the ordinance if we were to hold the meeting and transact business. The Colonial Council is the law-making body and should not be the law-breaking one too.
