TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Inverness Scotland, Oct. 5th.—Mr. Lloyd George speaking here concerning unemployment yesterday, touched on the Irish question, declaring the London Conference beginning October 11th between representatives of the Government and the Sinn Fein, "can only succeed if those who enter it make up their minds definitely resolved to trust to the common sense of their own people and do not try to reconcile the extremists." Mr. Lloyd George referred optimistically to the conference in Washington. It will constitute outstanding events which have a long history for centuries. Mr. Lloyd George said he had hoped to further the Irish question while in the Highlands, but through no fault of his own or his colleagues, he did not succeed. "At any rate when we enter the conference which will be held in London", he declared, "we shall do so with what is known as the Inverness formula which was signed in this very chamber and despatched to the representatives of the Irish people". Dealing with unemployment, the Prime Minister emphasized that it was not ordinary trade depression, but a world condition due to the shattering effects upon the world's trade, credit and competition. "The nations have had to mortgage their resources and pledge their future", he said. "The result is that it has led to imprisonment. Traders, investors and workingmen, and everybody dependent upon them, must be impoverished for years to come. Meantime", the Prime Minister said, "it was necessary to look after the needy."

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 5th.—The four units of the British North Atlantic

squadron, which have been visiting Montreal, Quebec and St. Johns, arrived here at 10 a.m. from the Newfoundland port, and after spending a week or ten days here, will leave for Bermuda. The ships are H. M. Ss. Raleigh, Constance, Cambrian and Calcutta. Vice-Admiral Sir William Pakenham, in command of the North Atlantic squadron, is on board H. M. S. Raleigh, which is the flagship of the fleet. She led the fleet into port this morning.

London, Oct. 5th.—What the characterized as the biggest demonstration of unemployment ever known in London occurred yesterday, when 10,000 workless including hundreds of women, some of them carrying banners, assembled in the Thames embankment and marched to Trafalgar square. Finding that closed to them, they marched to Hyde Park, where speeches were made, demanding work or maintenance. Harry Gosling, one of the foremost labour leaders, speaking before the London County Council yesterday, said, "the labor leaders are on the brink of losing control over the unemployed. Unless the unemployment question is settled immediately, there is bound to be a row, not only in London, but all over the country."

Geneva, Oct. 5th.—The assembly of the League of Nations took definite action yesterday on two important matters. It unanimously adopted an amendment to Art. 16 of the League Covenant relating to the blockade of any member resorting to war in disregard of the provisions of the covenant, and also a resolution postponing consideration of the amendment proposed last year by Argentina providing that all Sovereign states would automatically become members of the League. Article 16, as amended imposes upon the Council the duty of giving an opinion whether a breach of the covenant has taken place and in the event that it has the council will notify the League members of the date when it recommends for the application economic pressure.

New York, Oct. 5th.—With a crew consisting entirely of United States citizens the S/s. George Washington sailed yesterday from Hoboken. A few days ago 200 members of the crew were charged on the ground that they were not citizens, and their places were taken by men who could qualify on that ground. The rule of the United States Merchant Marine now is "no outsiders need apply."

London, Oct. 5th.—Large sums of money may be placed at the disposal of the German Govt. for use in the payment of reparations by the German Industrial Federation, says a Berlin despatch. The Federation has named a committee to negotiate with the Govt. regarding the details of the plan, the despatch says. Among the members of the committee are: Hugo Stinnes, German
