ST. CROIX STATION.

Los Angeles, California, July 23rd.—The entire list of Southern California countries was rocked by an earthquake of from 11 to 20 seconds duration at 11.38 o'clock last night. San Bernardino, where the greatest damage was caused, felt a second heavy shock at one o'clock this morning. Three sleeping men were injured seriously at San Bernardino when roofs fell in, although there have been no reports of death. Much damage was caused to property, buildings on streets running East and West being the chief sufferers. Santa Barbara was the extreme northern point from which earthquake reports were received and San Diego the farthest south. The shock extended eastward across the imperial valley, nearly to the Arizona state line.

Washington, July 23rd.—An earthquake of severe intensity and of two hours duration, estimated to have occurred 4,900 miles from Washington, was recorded yesterday on the Georgetown University Seismograph. The disturbance continued from 9.29 a. m. to 11.30 a. m. with the greatest intensity between 10 and 11 o'clock.

London, July 20th.—The contraband shipment of liquor from the West Indies to the United States again formed the basis for several questions yesterday in the House of Commons, various members appearing anxious to know if the Government was prepared to do everything

possible to prevent violation of the United States law by British interests. Mr. Ronald McNeill, replying for the Foreign Office, said a note received from the United States Government, a year ago had suggested that clearance papers be refused to vessels known to be carrying liquor. The British Government as known, was without power to give effect to the suggestion under the existing law, which did not, either in the United Kingdom or the West Indies, authorize refusal of clearance papers on the ground that a vessel was believed to be engaged in the liquor trade. Mr. McNeill added that the Government was fully aware of the desirability of doing everything in its power to disassociate itself from this traffic and the whole matter was being carefully considered.

Geneva, July 20th.—President Cosgrave, with a strong delegation from the Irish Free State, will probably come to Geneva for the annual meeting of the assembly of the League of Nations in September, when the Free State is expected to be elected a member of the League. This announcement was made yesterday by Mr. Michael MacWhite, permanent representative of the Free State here. "Rest assured Ireland will have her independence programme toward the League" said Mr. MacWhite, "we are not tied up with other European nations, as most of the members of the League are and we feel that our independence can do good. Ireland wants international help," he continued. "Her

opportunity for economic developments and prosperity is dependent upon a settlement of Europe's woes, hence Dublin's keen interest in a solution of the reparation problem." Mr. MacWhite declared the Irish delegation would throw its weight on the side of international cooperation through the League. The world need have no fear, he added, that Ireland's admission would mean another vote in the assembly for Great Britain.

London, July 21st.—The striking dock workers at London and Hull are holding out, although the strike has collapsed in all the other principal ports. The Hull men, however, show signs of wavering and Secretary Bevin, of the dock works union, believes it will not be long before the whole movement, which began with an unofficial strike in Hull early in the month will collapse. The men at Birkenhead resumed work yesterday and the Manchester strikers will return to their duties on Monday.

New York, July 21st.—The early merger of the world's largest tobacco concerns, the tobacco products corporation and the British American Tobacco Company, into a new company was reported in Wall Street today.

London, July 21st.—The high commissioner for Canada has arranged with the Greek Government that they shall pay Canada immediately a sum of 100,000 interest on the 7,000,000 owing by Greece to the dominion. Further interest is to be paid promptly. A portion of the proceeds of the first loan to be placed to the credit of a sinking fund, which is to be created for the purpose of meeting the principal debt.

Belfast, July 21st.—It is persistently reported that Sir James Craig will resign as Premier of Ulster, according to the Irish News, a nationalist newspaper. The reports are based apparently on the absence of the Premier from Belfast last week for the Orange demonstrations. Belfast News says that Sir James name has been associated with the coming appointment to a colonial Governorship. It is stated that he was offered a colonial post in 1921, but refused, because it necessitated his withdrawal from Irish politics during that critical period. The Premier has not changed his views on the proposal to settle the boundary dispute between Ulster and the Free State through a boundary commission, judging from a recent interview in which he said, "I am advised by the highest authorities that the commission cannot continue until a representative is appointed by us, and that we refused to do. From the outset, the Premier added, "It was apparent to me that the contracting parties to the Irish Free State failed to make their agreement water tight, but Ulster cannot be blamed for that". It is believed here that Lord Carson, Lord of appeal is the highest legal authority quoted by Sir James.
