TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Barbados, Nov. 30th.—The following is taken from one of our local newspapers of today's date: "We understand that the business of Dacosta and Coy. & Gardiner Austin and Coy. have been converted into limited liability companies and have been duly registered as from yesterday. The Barbados Shipping and Trading Co. Ltd. has also been formed and registered with an authorized capital of £750,000 to acquire a controlling interest in the businesses mentioned above as well as in Manning and Co. Ltd., Wilkinson & Haynes and Co. Ltd., S. P. Musson Son and Co. and R. and G. Challenor which two latter firms are now in course of conversion into limited liability companies and will be registered at an early date."

Cairo, Nov. 29th.—The Government has appointed a commission consisting of three Egyptians and three British subjects to study the economic effects on Egypt of the world-wide fall on the price of cotton and possible measures for alleviation.

London, Nov. 29th.—Half a dozen men who were preparing to set fire to a large lumber yard in the district of Finsbury, an important section of the City of London, less than a mile north

of the river, were surprised by the police last night. The attack was coincident with the discovery of incendiary fires in the yard. A policeman challenged the men and immediately attacked the one who refused to be helped. Five men were arrested. Five men answered his call emerging from behind some empty wagons. The policeman who was with them was unable to liberate the men he had seen. All the men escaped. Searching behind the wagons the policeman found that cotton waste soaked with gasoline had been pushed through a gate of a lumber yard and he also discovered two revolvers and 100 cartridges. One of the supposed incendiaries was later arrested.

Belfast, Nov. 28th.—A statement issued tonight from Dublin Castle after giving account of the Liverpool fires and accompanying incidents adds:—"Read in conjunction with the documents discovered last week, in which plans for Sinn Fein reprisals against the English towns of Manchester and Liverpool, among a number of others were detailed, these things have a very sinister aspect. The fact of the police being fired on suggests that the methods of the Sinn Fein murder gang in Ireland are being employed against the English people, even if the personnel of the murderers is not the same.

Madrid, Nov. 28th.—Serious earthquake shocks have caused extensive damage in north-western Spain centering in the rontevedra district. In the cities of Corunna, Lugo, Vigo and Ferrol buildings were shattered by the force of the concussion.

Geneva, Nov. 29th.—The question whether countries will be allowed to control and dispose of at will their natural resources is the subject of a sharp conflict in a committee of the Assembly. The controversy is over a resolution by Gustave Ador, Switzerland, setting up a permanent economic and financial commission, one of the duties of which would be to examine measures for preventing monopolies in the raw materials and the means of controlling their distribution. The resolution is based on article 23 of the Covenant, which assures all states equitable treatment. It is supported chiefly by Italy, Switzerland and other countries rich in raw materials. One of the strongest opponents of the resolution is Sir George Foster, Canada, who has taken the same attitude as Mr. Rowell also of Canada who served notice on the Assembly in an impressive speech recently that any attempt to exercise such control would be regarded as interference in international affairs to which Canada would never submit. Mr. Rowell at the same time said that the entry of the United States could not be hoped for if such interferences were attempted.

London, Nov. 29th.—As an additional precaution against suspected Sinn Fein

outrages, a police motor boat armed with a machine gun was placed on patrol along the river front of the Houses of Parliament today.

Dublin, Nov. 29th.—Raids and arrests continued in Dublin today. Among the persons taken into custody was William Sears, Sinn Fein member of Parliament for the southern division of County Mayo.

London, Nov. 29th.—The public galleries of the House of Commons were closed this afternoon and the approaches to the House of Parliament were guarded by extra police as a precaution against possible untoward incidents following the disclosure of an alleged Sinn Fein conspiracy for operations in England. The speaker, Mr. Lowther, stated in the House of Commons in answer to a question, that he had ordered the galleries closed as a result of information he had received from the chief commissioner today. The latest Sinn Fein developments in England were discussed at an important conference this afternoon at No. 10 Downing Street, between members of the Government and the heads of the police organization. The conferees, included the Premier Mr. Winston Churchill, Sir Hamar Greenwood, Mr. Lowther, speaker of the House of Commons, and the heads of the Metropolitan Police and Scotland Yard. The closing of the public galleries of the House of Commons followed this meeting. The public will not only be excluded from the galleries of the House of Commons, but denied admission to the Sinn Fein precincts of the House. Members of the House of Commons will only be able to interview their constituents in the outer lobbies. Persons having business in the House and unknown to the police will be searched. Motor traffic into the palace yard also will be subject to special observations. The House of Lords has adopted resolutions similar to the House of Commons.

London, Nov. 29th.—The premises of the Sinn Fein bank in Harcourt Street, Dublin, were set on fire this morning, says a despatch to the Telegraph Exchange this morning.

London, Nov. 30th.—A bomb was exploded at one o'clock this morning in the building occupied by a hide merchant in Old Swan Lane Bar, London. A floor of the building was wrecked, but nobody was injured. The bombs apparently had been left in the building in a gripsack.

Gedsl, Nov. 29th.—The terms of the treaty with Nikolai Lenine, the Russian Soviet Minister, being concluded with Mustapha Pasha, leader of the Turkish Nationalists, striking at allied influence, has been received by the "Journal de Geneve" from its Constantinople correspondent. There are eight sections. The first assures the integrity and restoration of Turkish authority in all pre-war territories. The second assures Turkey the control of the new states of Syria and Arabia.
