LOCAL.

An unexpected mail from the States by the s. s. Montgomery City via St. Thomas arrived here on the Creole yesterday afternoon. This dispatch left New York on the 30th. ultimo, it is advised.

The second instalment of Mathias Sandorf, at the theatre last night was as the first very interesting.

If the football team of a visiting British warship recently defeated the St. Thomas Stars which club holds the championship of the Virgin Islands, by six goals to none, St. Croix players must certainly have nerve to challenge the Tommies of H. M. S. Constance. It is understood that the game will be contested on the Oval, Frederiksted, which is to be regretted as the high winds that prevail as a rule on this island interferes seriously with the progress of the rushing side since the ball is continually being blown outside the lines. From the bumpiness of the ground Prosperity pasture is also unsuited to football, leaving Frederiksted practically without any well laid plots which would be appreciated by the visiting team, and it is suggested that they be invited to Christiansted and the game played on the Parade Ground which certainly could be secured for the occasion and would afford more general satisfaction to the contestants and spectators alike.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

Paris, Nov. 6th.—The British Government has requested a postponement until November 27th. of the Lausanne conference on account of the British elections. Although the French Government has not as yet replied officially, it was said at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs that the Premier would object to such a long delay, but might consent to a shorter postponement and the twentieth of November is mentioned as the probable date.

New York, Nov. 7th.—The election, as governor, of Mr. Smith is expected. The first five women candidates for the House of Representatives to appear in the election returns have been defeated, four in Pennsylvania and one in North Carolina. There appears a chance, that owing to

the continued democratic gains throughout the country, the republican majority may be wiped out or at any rate be reduced to a slim administration working force. The defeated candidates include many prominent figures and friends of President Harding.

St. Paul, Minnesota, Nov. 7th.—Mr. Volstead was falling behind in the early election returns.

London, Nov. 7th.—Sugar in stock on the 4th. instant was 111,000 tons. Last year 58,000 tons.

Paris, Nov. 7th.—The French and British Govts. are in full accord and will insist that the Angora Govt. respect the terms of the Mudania Conference and instructions to the High Commissioners at Constantinople have been drawn up in that spirit.

Constantinople, Nov. 7th.—Although the Nationalist civil power is in control in Constantinople, the Entente does not intend, at least for the present, to lose its grip on the military authority. There is every desire to meet the Turkish aspirations within proper limits and to this end the Allied High Commissioners today issued the following statement: The inter-Allied High Commissioners are firmly resolved to observe strict impartiality with regard to events, which concern the internal policy of Turkey, but the Allied Generals will continue to apply the causes of the Mudania Conference and maintain order and security in the zones occupied by the Allied armies.

Berlin, Nov. 7th.—The Reparations Commission has handed the German Govt. another note, impressing upon Germany the necessity for making more definite proposals for the stabilization of the mark and reminding the Govt. of its undertakings last July with regard to the regulation of Germany's finances.

Newcastle, Nov. 7th.—Mr. Lloyd George made some sharp references to the crisis, which has arisen in the Near East since his fall from the Premiership. In a political address, which he delivered before a large assembly here "The Near East is beginning to show symptoms and inflammation," he said, "and whatever happens our flag must not be let down". Later on in his speech he said, "we have got rid of the Turk, but he looked at the list of our new Ministers and came to the conclusion that this was the time for another try. If the Govt. stand by the flag, my friends, I will be whole-hearted behind them and I entreat the Govt. to show the Turk that we will not be trifled with and that he must not stand by the documents, which he signed but a few weeks ago at Mudania".

Constantinople, Nov. 7th.—Ali Kemal Bey, the Editor of a Constantinople anti-Nationalist newspaper, has been arrested and condemned to death by the Turkish authorities here. The Allied representatives, on being informed of this late last night, gave Rafet Pasha forty-eight hours

in which to release the Editor. Rafet replied he was unaware of the arrest, but would investigate the matter.

London, Nov. 7th.—Surprising demands which the Kemalists made upon the Allies in Constantinople since they took over the civil Govt. there on Saturday, still cause a great deal of anxiety in London, the feeling of uneasiness being intensified by the scarcity of news from Constantinople in the last thirty-six hours. All the newspapers treat the situation seriously and prominently. A deep suspicion of the aims of the Turkish Nationalists is almost unanimous among all papers and all of them seem worried about the safety of the non-Turkish population at the Sublime Porte.

Paris, Nov. 7th.—Another French delegate to the Lausanne peace conference will be M. Barrero, Ambassador to Italy.

Paris, Nov. 7th.—The pound sterling made a new high record on the Paris Bourse today, the average quotation being nine francs fifty centimes or two francs five centimes above the previous top mark of sixty-seven francs forty-five centimes reached in April 1920.

Washington, Nov. 7th.—The President will not proclaim a national holiday on Armistice Day this year. This announcement came from the White House today.

Washington, Nov. 7th.—The President expects to issue a call on Thursday or Friday for a special session of Congress convening on the twentieth instant it was announced today at the White House.

Paris, Nov. 7th.—The Government appears to have reached the limits of its patience in dealing with the Turks and its tending more and more to a stiffening of its attitude towards the Angora Government. The feeling here is that the representatives at Constantinople of the Angora Government may be pursuing their present tactics with the idea of possibly little by little undermining the authority of the allies in advance of the decisions of the Lausanne peace conference.

Dublin, Nov. 7th.—The Free State Government's answer to Mr. De Valera's manifesto recently issued was to order the arrest of all important members of the anti-treaty council of state and as De Valera heads a definite organization working for the overthrow of the Free State Government, he also is now liable to arrest. Prior to the proclamation of his council of state he was ignored because he was considered powerless.

New York, Nov. 7th.—A proposal to divide the competition for the Davis Cup into two geographical zones, American and European, will be acted upon at the International Lawn Tennis Conference to be held in London on December 20th.

Paris, Nov. 7th.—A message from the Greek Consul General at Beirut, according to the Greek Legation here, says that the Turks burned the Greek prisoners in a concentration Camp at Caehaera (?) and massacred the Christian inhabi-
