LOCAL.

The weather disturbance travelling toward these islands passed south of Porto Rico last night according to advices published by the Weather Bureau at San Juan, and given out in our extra of yesterday evening. Fortunately there has been evidence of storm here beyond brisk breezes throughout the night accompanied with lightning and thunder. Some rain was hoped for as a result of the cyclonic condition of the weather, but up to the present there has been none.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Sept. 6th.—Plans for aiding New York's army of 500,000 unemployed were taken up at a meeting today at the new industrial bureau, created by the legislature. The establishment of great dormitories in the national guard armories and the organization of free kitchens were two proposals for ameliorating the condition of the unemployed taken by the bureau. Plans also were discussed for stimulating public buildings to provide work for some of the unemployed.

New York, Sept. 6th.—Advances of \$10 a bale were scored in the cotton market today on both contracts and spots. In the contract market the close were strong at the highest of the day, with all trading months two hundred points up, the full limit of fluctuations allowed under the cotton exchange rules. October closed at 19.4-9 and May at 20.10 cents a pound, the highest prices reported since early last winter. Middling spots were quoted at 19.00 cents.

The strength of Liverpool during the American holiday yesterday and again today, and reports of a much larger business doing by American mills, were the main features of the buying.

New York, Sept. 6th.—Gold coin and bullion and silver bars having an estimated value of \$9,000,000 were received at this port today from Germany, France, Turkey, Egypt, England and Latin American countries. The German Reichs Bank forwarded approximately \$3,000,000 to the Federal Reserve Bank, presumably in connection with further German reparations obligations. Private cables from Berlin referred to impending shipments of gold in large volumes en route to this country for the purpose.

Sept. 6th.—Among the resolutions adopted by the Pan-African Congress, which is in session here, was one introduced by delegate Gervais of Haiti, protesting against United States troops occupying Haiti.

Detroit, Michigan, Sept. 6th.—United States today retained the Harmsworth trophy by default, the racing commission deciding not to hold a second heat after the "Mapleleaf VII", the British challenger, was forced out of the first heat today when she sprang a leak on the second lap and was towed off the course. The British speed boat sank before reaching her slip. Mishap also overcame "Miss American II" which tore off a patch from her hull and was forced to withdraw. "Miss American II" and "Miss Chicago" then fought the heat alone, G. A. Woods, "Defender" scoring an easy victory over the Chicago boat, covering the course of 40 nautical miles in 46.16.23. "Miss America" attained a speed of 71.01 miles per hour on the fourth lap.

Geneva, Sept. 5th.—The air was charged with electricity when the delegates to the league assembly gathered this morning. The storm centred round the Chilean delegation, a number of the leaders engaging in an earnest discussion

with Augustin Edwards, head of the delegation regarding the Tacnaarica question. It had been reported on good authority that the Chileans would leave the assembly, if this question was placed on the agenda, as requested by Bolivia for revision of the treaty of 1904. The report was presented despite the refusal of the delegation to confirm it until Senor Edwards gave out a flat denial. The assembly nevertheless remained agitated and conferences continued on the floor until President Von Karnebeek called the assembly to order half an hour later. He proposed, that, instead of discussing the agenda, which included the subject of Tacnaarica, the assembly completed its organization. This occupied all the morning and afternoon sessions. Efforts at conciliation in the Chilean-Bolivian conflict were continued throughout the day by Lord Robert Cecil, who represents South Africa, and others, but without success. The uneasiness caused by this incident increased during the afternoon. It was announced then that the Bolivians were determined to maintain their demands and intended to ask instructions from their Government in case the assembly rejected it. The Bolivians declined to state categorically whether they would leave the assembly but expressed the fear that public opinion in Bolivia would demand their withdrawal if the assembly refused to arbitrate the question. The Bolivians said they were willing to submit the question to the international court but the Chileans declined to do so.

Doncaster, Eng., Sept. 7th.—Lord Londonderry's polemarch won the St. Leger stakes of 6,500 sovereigns from a field of nine horses here today. Lord Carnarvon's "Franklin" was second and Lord Glanley's "Westward Ho" third. The race was run over the St. Leger course of a little more than a mile and six furlongs.

New York, Sept. 7th.—The cotton market had another wild opening today and on first prices showed an advance equal to about \$7 to \$9 a bale.

New Orleans, Sept. 7th.—The most remarkable exhibition of strength in the history of cotton trading, according to exchange experts, was given on the New Orleans exchange today when all months in the future markets opened \$10 a bale over yesterday's close.

Inverness, Scotland, Sept. 7th.—The British cabinet at its meeting here today unanimously approved the reply of the Government to Mr. De Valera's last note. The reply was handed to Robert C. Barton, Sinn Fein courier, who started for Dublin at four p. m. with it. The cabinet decision will be made public on Thursday night. Prior to the cabinet meeting Mr. Lloyd George took breakfast with the King and it is understood that they conversed upon the Irish situation.
