Bochum, Germany, May 20th.—(United Press) Many emergency workers in the Ruhr mines, where a general strike is in effect, have disappeared and the authorities fear they have been murdered as part of a campaign of sabotage which daily is growing more desperate. The police today arrested a number of leaders of the "union," the Ruhr Communist miners organization, and afterwards searched their headquarters.

London, May 20th.—(United Press) "Will Great Britain make war just for a scrap of paper?" The historic words of Bethmann Hollweg spoken August 4th 1914, were recalled today when Sir Edward Goschen, who was Ambassador to Berlin when the war was declared, died at his home here today. It was Sir Edward who presented to the Imperial German Government an ultimatum demanding that the neutrality of Belgium be respected and who subsequently saw Bethmann Hollweg and received the famous "scrap of paper" query.

Dublin, May 20th.—The Local Government Minister of the Irish Free State issued an order to day dissolving the Dublin Corporation as from this evening. The order states that the Minister, on investigation, find the duties of the members not being duly and effectually discharged, therefore he has appointed three commissioners to perform the council's duties.

Willich, Rhenish, Prussia, May 20th (Associated Press)—The Becker Steel Works, manufacturers of high grade finished steel and one of the largest industrial plants in Germany, has petitioned for a receivership. This is the first case of a large industrial insolvency since the stabilization of the mark. The firm's plant is valued at 36,000,000 gold marks its stock at 6,000,000 and bills receivable at 3,000,000. The total obligations are 9,000,000 gold marks.

Paris, May 20th.—Complete reorganization of the Diplomatic Corps, with the Ambassadors in Washington, London and Berlin, being changed, is announced as one of the first actions of the next Cabinet, according to the Radical newspaper "Ere Nouvelle" which is in the confidence of M. Herriot and other leaders. "M. Shanghai, May 21st.—Major Maclaren aviator flying around the world, arrived at Anyab, Burma, today from Calcutta, said a despatch from the former point received here tonight.

Tokio, May 21st.—The United States army aviators flying round the world are being delayed at Hittakappa Bay, Island of Teorofu by bad weather.

Shanghai, May 21st.—Captain Doisy, French aviator who damaged his plane yesterday in landing here, has overcome his disappointment and the interruption to his projected flight from Paris to Tokio and is considering seriously the offer of a Chinese plane for continuing his flight. The offer was made yesterday by General Fenling, Military Governor of Shanghai. If Captain Doisy accepts, he will proceed towards Tokio within a week. A survey of the situation reveals that there are available only what Doisy terms reconnaissance airplanes but he believed that one of them, a Bregute, is capable of carrying on his journey, rearranged into shorter stages. The route he would follow is as follows. From Shanghai to Hanking, Binanfu, Peking Kukden, Seoul, Fusan and Nagasaki to Tokio. Acting preparation of landing places at such of those points as are not already provided with them have been begun on the assumption the Frenchman will fly on. Captain Doisy, in a statement today, strongly recommended that airplanes used for such flights as his be fitted for either pontoons or landing gears.

HARK! HEAR THE STARS TWINKLE

Science says light and sound are one and the same. Gen. Ferie, Maj. Mesny and M. Jouaust of a French wireless laboratory claim to have succeeded in transforming light rays into audible sounds. It is known that under the action of light photo-electric cells with a foundation of selenium give off an extremely feeble electric current. Using a four-electrode lamp, the Frenchmen are said to have obtained variations of current from the star Capella, many millions of miles distant from the earth. Later, by using powerful amplifiers, they said they actually "heard" the light rays through a telephone head-piece.—*The Pathfinder May 3rd.*

ANTI GERMAN PARADES HELD IN RUSSIA.

Crowds March on Embassy in Moscow, but Order Maintained by Troops.

Moscow, May 13—Anti-German demonstrations were held throughout Russia Sunday.

Workmen, students and government employees paraded the streets of Moscow carrying flaming banners the legends: "Don't Play With Fire, Mr. Stresemann", "The Time of Brest-Litovsk Has Already Passed—Down With the German Social Democracy," and "Hands Off the Soviet Mission. Long Live the Revolution."

Groups of demonstrators marched toward the German embassy singing revolutionary songs and shouting protests against the recent German raid on the Soviet Trade Mission in Berlin.

The crowds were prevented from closely approaching the embassy by a mounted detachment of troops and order was maintained.

While these events were proceeding a number of the leading Soviet officials gathered in front of the Foreign Office for the unveiling of the monument to Vaslav Vorovsky, Soviet envoy assassinated in Switzerland.

The demonstrations were taken as evidence that Russia was growing stronger. Karl Radek, speaking for the government, made it clear that Russia did not intend to serve an ultimatum on Germany in consequence of the Berlin raid, as Germany was not considered a serious adversary, and it was believed the Berlin government would soon be brought to realize by its own people the importance of friendly relations with its nearest powerful neighbor.—*Boston American, May 13th.*
