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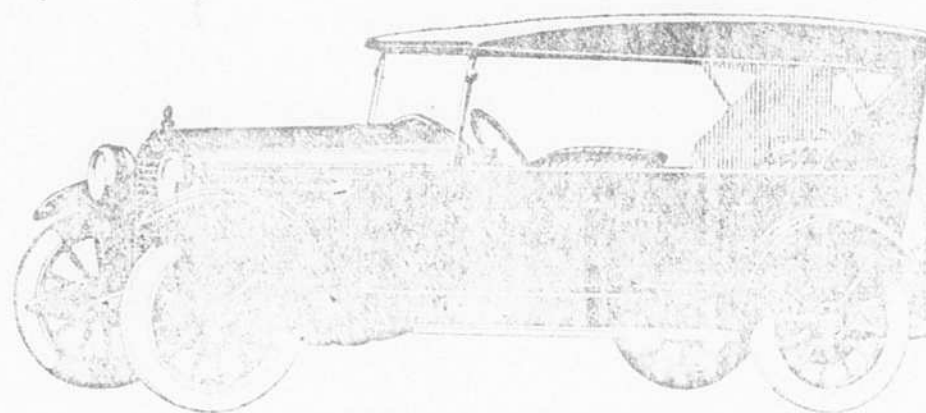
TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

Capetown, South Africa, April 23rd. —Manie Maritz, ex-Boer General, one of the most prominent figures in the rebellion of 1914, was sentenced today to imprisonment for three years. The case against Maritz, who was living in exile since 1914, until a few months ago had several features. Maritz not only was a member of the defences but he persuaded his subordinates therein to join the rebellion along with him and he banded over the loyal members of the force to Germany in South West Africa. In sentencing Maritz, the judge took into account the ex-Boer General's sufferings while in exile and sentences the prisoner to a three year term, instead of a longer period.

London, April 28rd. —President Coolidge speech in New York yesterday has been favourably received here, both by the press and by the officials of the Government, it is expected that the Prime Minister himself will take the earliest opportunity to proclaim either in the House of Commons or in a public address outside, his wholehearted support of the American Executive proposed conference for further world disarmament.

London, April 24th. —When the British Empire Exhibition was formally opened by H. M. The King yesterday, the West Indian Court was one of those most beautiful complete. To achieve this result the commissioners and their voluntary helpers had been working day and night. The predominant colour note of the West Indian Court is yellow and orange, a combination which shows off this particular type of exhibit to perfection. 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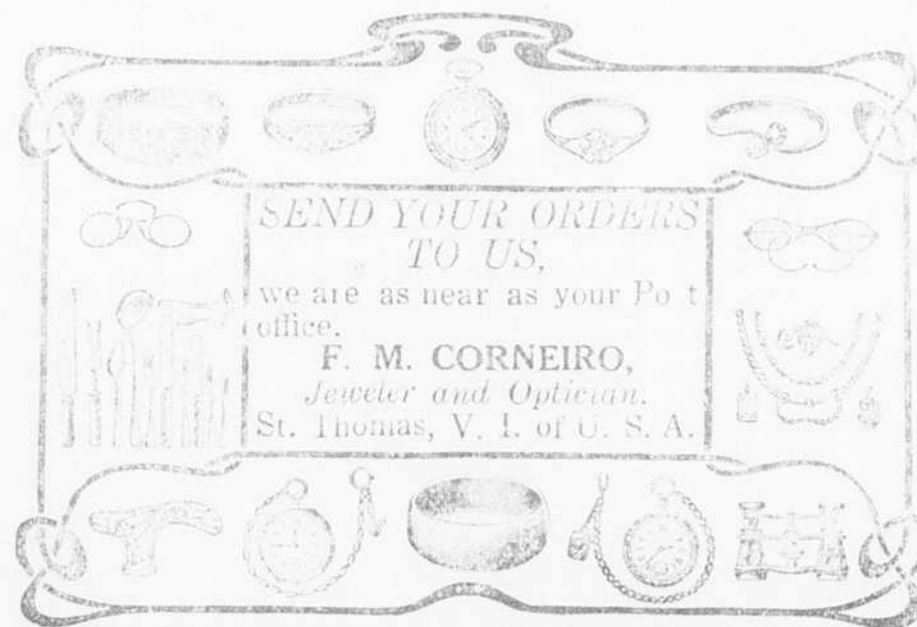
