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TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Lisbon, Feb. 3rd.—The resignation of the Cabinet has been accepted.

Belfast, Feb. 3rd.—The railway managements and employees have failed to reach an agreement and the Ulster Minister of Labour Mr. Andrews has been urgently summoned to return to Dublin to renew the efforts for a settlement with Mr. Joseph Mc Grath, Minister of Labour in the Dail Cabinet. If the negotiations definitely collapse a general strike throughout Ireland will go into effect on February 15th. Sixty one passengers of the steamship Cedric, who were landed yesterday at Queenstown, are unable to depart as no trains are running from either Queenstown or Cork.

Dublin, Feb. 3rd.—Commenting on the conference here between Sir James Craig Premier of Ulster and Mr. Collins the Freeman's Journal says it would have been a miracle if an adjustment were reached in a single afternoon. Yet some body expected a miracle, the newspaper adds, for we were told a serious situation has arisen. We trust this does not mean that the whole pact between the North and South is imperilled, for although the North hitherto has reaped the main advantages, it would be unfortunate were the quarrel renewed over conditions. There is no reason why the truce should not be maintained even if the free State has to fall back on the treaty for the settlement of boundaries. Mr. Collins willingness to depart from the agreement provided by the treaty was due to his patriotic aspirations, to prove that these matters can be settled

best by Irishmen without British interference, says the British Times. Further discussions ought to be arranged and if an early agreement is not reached the whole questions of boundaries ought to be postponed for submission to a conference between the first government of the

free State and the northern government. The solution may be slow, but we refuse to doubt that statesmanship, working in an atmosphere of goodwill can find it. War with Ulster will mean a rigid fixation of the present boundaries, peace with Ulster will re-adjust them.
