

ing past week the Polish army captured 52,000 prisoners, 180 guns 1,100 machine guns, 7 armoured trains, 28 locomotives and a large quantity of munitions.

New York, Oct. 5th.—The longshoremen have voted to continue the present wage agreement for one year without an increase. Mates, sailors, firemen etc. made the same agreement a short time ago.

New Orleans, Oct. 5th.—The British steamer *Westerian* en route for New Orleans was lost in the hurricane during last week.

Paris, Oct. 5th.—M. Millerand has given instructions for the taking of a new census. The work will commence on the sixth of March next.

Paris, Oct. 5th.—The French budget for next year will reach a total of twenty-six milliards of francs. The sum of twenty-four milliards has been fixed for the reparations due by Germany.

Dublin, Oct. 5th.—A military patrol having taken possession of the correspondence which arrived this morning by train, a group of merchants has requested that the letters be delivered after their examination.

Cork, Oct. 5th.—Shots were exchanged this morning between a military patrol and a number of persons and later the military were compelled to use machine-guns. In the evening an armed party attacked a police barrack, taking prisoners eleven policemen and capturing a large quantity of arms and ammunition. The building was burned by the rebels.

Berlin, Oct. 5th.—Herr Dittmann, a member of the independent socialist party of the Reichstag has declared that only dreamers can believe that the Russian Red Army can triumph in Germany and establish a Soviet by the aid of which it would make war on France. Herr Dittmann, who was one of the German delegation to the Communist Congress at Moscow, has made a study of Bolshevism and in an article published by the "Freitag" declared it to be an impossible system, owing to the great ignorance of the Russian peasants. The German workingmen, he adds, will never submit to such dictatorship and he concludes by declaring that his countrymen have nothing in common with men who are neither socialists nor communists and who have only vague conception of politics, government and society. The greater number of the Russian Bolsheviks are unable to read and write and their intellectual horizon does not exceed their visual power, as was the case with the peasants of the middle ages. These men nevertheless constitute seventy-five per cent of the population of the country. A fervent idealism and blind passions have raised the Soviet of Russia to the category of a promised land where all the troubles of the Proletariat come to an end.

Trinidad, Oct. 6th.—News has been

received here of the death from pneumonia on Sunday last at Toronto of the Hon. Adam Smith, C.M.G., senior member of the firm of Messrs. Smith, Robertson & Co. of this city and Honorary Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

Antigua, Oct. 4th.—A telegram was received by the Hon. Donald McDonald on Saturday last from the Air Ministry, London, as follows: "Deeply regret to inform you that cable from Baghdad states Flying officer I. D. R. McDonald, M. C. D. F. C., was shot down and taken prisoner on the 22nd of Sept. He is now reported to have been killed at Dagsetora.

Constantinople, Oct. 6th.—More than ten thousand prisoners and a good quantity of war material have been captured by Genl. Wrangel in the zone of Donetz and Usovka, according to official information received here today.

Riga, Oct. 6th.—According to a despatch to Warsaw from this city, hostilities between the Bolshevik and Polish armies will cease on Friday next, in compliance with the fundamental terms of the armistice.

Paris, Oct. 6th.—According to information received in this city the Italian Govt. have refused permission for the ex-King Constantine of Greece to enter Italian territory.

New York, Oct. 6th.—Associated Press. New low record prices for the year were established yesterday in the sugar market. Five thousand bags of Porto Rican sugar were sold at seven twenty eight hundredths cents, delivered to refiners. Full duty sugars were offered at seven cents, but were not taken.

Riga, Oct. 6th.—Associated Press. The Polish and Bolshevik delegates agreed to recognize the independence of the Ukrainians, Poland to be free of debt on account of old Russia and the Bolsheviks to indemnify Polish civilians. The delegations plan to sign the armistice on Oct. 8th.

Chicago, Oct. 6th.—Associated Press. Senator Harding was here last night en route to Des Moines, Iowa. It is expected that he will elaborate his views on the League of Nations in his Des Moines speech.

General Superintendent's Office, St. Thomas, Oct. 7th.—The Cable Ship "Henry Holmes" which has been undergoing her number three survey at Trinidad, having now been released, left there today for St. Thomas and will resume her work of maintaining the Company's cable system in order.

"CORPSE" REBUKED REVELERS.

Jenns Jonssen a farmer in Sweden, fell ill and within a week died. His body was placed in a coffin and for three days was kept in the house. In accordance with an old custom, the neighbors called to pay their last respects and to partake of whatever refreshments were provided.

On the evening of the fourth day, according to an account vouched for by a score of witnesses, as the "mourners" were hilariously eating and drinking, there was a stir in the coffin. The "dead" man slowly raised himself to a sitting posture and in these words rebuked his family and those assembled to "comfort" them:—

"You thought me dead. I may have been, but the sounds of your revelry awoke me. Shame on you all for spending my money in feasting! I have done with you and prefer the next world to your society."

Jonssen's eyes closed, his body relaxed, and he sank back into the coffin, actually dead this time. The funeral and burial occurred the following day, attended by everybody in the village.—*Barbados Globe*.
