London, May 11st. —Mr. Lloyd George has gone to Hythe, near Dover where he will spend the weekend with Sir Philip Sassoon. There is no disposition on the part of the French Premier to discuss the Silesian situation with Mr. Lloyd George before Tuesday, after the meeting of the Chamber of Deputies. Advices received from Silesia would appear to indicate that neither the Poles nor the Germans are taking the offensive, pending a meeting of the French and British Premiers. The proposed meeting of the Supreme Allied Council for the purpose of discussing Silesia appear today to have been pushed indefinitely into the future.

Berlin, May 22nd. —A despatch from a German source at Oppelen says Polish reinforcements have crossed the frontier into upper Silesia and that there were severe fighting on Sunday in the neighbourhood of Rosenberg. The insurgents were obliged to evacuate several villages. The final outcome of the affray has not been reported.

Madrid, May 22nd. —The *Diempo* today prints under reserve a report from travellers reaching Vigo, to the effect that a revolution has broken out in Lisbon, Portugal. According to the travellers the members of the Cabinet have been imprisoned and Machado Dossantos has been proclaimed President of the Republic.

New York, May 22nd. Proposals of Federal mediators looking to a settlement of the Nation Wide Marine Strike, which has been in effect since May 1st, were unanimously rejected at a meeting here today.

San Juan, P. R. May 23rd. —Governor Arthur Yager left yesterday afternoon for the United States. His successor, Mr. F. Mount Riley has not yet arrived. The Treasurer of Puerto Rico, The Hon. Jose E. Benidecto, will act until his arrival.

London, May 23rd. —A despatch from Cairo to the Exchange Telegraph Company reports many dead lying in the streets of Alexandria. One report states that two Europeans were drenched with petrol and burned in the streets. On Sunday evening it is known some benzine stores near the Alexandria docks were ransacked. A band of 1,500 armed Bedouins, says the Cairo message, are reported to be advancing on Ramleh, five miles north of Alexandria to participate in a general revolution, which but for the presence of the British may succeed. Many telephone lines have been cut. Cairo, adds the message is in an excited state, but no disorders have developed there.

Alexandria, May 23rd. —Five Europeans were killed and 72 others wounded in a riot here on Sunday night and this morning, it was announced at noon today. The police casualties were not given out.

London, May 23rd. —Many persons are reported to have been killed in an outbreak in Alexandria, where natives attacked Europeans, says a despatch from that city. British troops have taken charge of the town. It is rumoured that the outbreak arose from the killing of a native by a Greek, which led to attacks by the natives and students on Greeks and other Europeans. Ambulances were busy all night taking the wounded to hospitals. Many fires were started and in some districts it was reported that patients were burned alive. During the night the rioters smashed windows for several hours and this morning all business places are closed. Before the arrival of the soldiers this morning the Europeans had gathered at the Government Offices and they greeted the troops with great enthusiasm.

Constantinople, May 21st. —French troops have captured 200 bandits in a battle fought west of Tcharalem, at Thrace. Among the prisoners was the chief colonel.

London, May 22nd. —The Govt. has decided to send troops to Silesia at an early date, it was announced today.

Paris, May 23rd. —The High Commission in Upper Silesia has sent delegates to intervene with both Germans and Poles and endeavour to obtain a cessation of all Military operations in that territory, according to French official despatches today.

Hoyleake England, May 23rd. —The United States Golf Team, which is to contest the British Amateur Championship beginning today, made a clean sweep in the four-somes arranged as part of a preliminary series of matches with British players, contested here on Saturday. All four were won by U. S. Pairs.

Tokio, May 22nd. —Japan is to evacuate Siberia and to restore Shantung to China at the earliest possible moment according to a statement by an official of the Foreign Office, following the adjournment today of the Colonial Conference, which has been in session here for the last week. According to the "Eichinichi Shimbun" Japan's

conditions of withdrawal from Shantung include assurance of the maintenance of peace and order in the three far eastern provinces, with safeguards against the establishment of Communism and protection of Japan's economic interests.

Leipzig, Germany, May 23rd. —The trial of war criminals, as provided in the Versailles Treaty, opens in the Supreme Court here today. Little interest was displayed by the public, and there was only a small gathering outside the court to watch the arrival of the British Commissioners, headed by Sir Ernest Pollock, a Solicitor General of Great Britain.
