the present time and that date, depositors in the banks will be able to demand more than ten per cent of their deposits unless required for the payment of customs duties and taxes.

London, Oct. 5th.—The continual retirement of the Russians in the regions west of Minsk, where the Poles have been rapidly driven eastward, is reported in Monday's Soviet official statement from Moscow.

London, Oct. 5th.—Field Marshal Earl Haig, speaking at Glasgow, expressed a desire to see a great united Empire organization for helping ex-officers and men, two hundred thousand of whom are out of work and their numbers are increasing. The Field Marshal mentioned that he would visit Capetown next Spring to assist in forming such an organization.

London, Oct. 5th.—Canadian Shipping interests are making determined efforts to capture British trade and for Canadian ownership of ships. Captain Smith, of the Canadian Merchant Marine, appeals to British merchants to deal direct with Canada through Canadian agents, and forget the idea that the Canadian market is best approached through New York. He says legitimate attempts are being made to provide the necessary ships for Canada's export and import trade and to open new avenues of direct trade with Canada through Canadian ports, and that much of Canada's trade is being carried on through the medium of the United States, which has an adverse influence here on currency.

London, Oct. 5th.—As a result of Mr. MacSweeney's long fast, Irish prisoners have ceased to resort to hunger-strike, says the Daily Mail today. The newspaper adds that there were more than three hundred arrests in connection with Sinn Fein propaganda disturbances during September, but only four of the number arrested attempted hunger-striking, and these abandoned it in a day or two.

Berlin, Oct. 5th.—The Steamship Bismarck, which would have been the world's largest vessel, has been burned at Hamburg. The gross tonnage of the Bismarck was said to have been 56,000, as against 54,282 of the Vaterland. No explanation is given in the despatch as to the cause of the fire. The Bismarck was being built at the yards of Messrs. Blohm and Voss, and would have been delivered to the Allies under the terms of the peace treaty.

Ancona, Italy, Oct. 5th.—Sixty persons who were arrested during anarchist riots here last June have started a hunger strike, as a protest against the delay in being brought to trial. The workmen in this city, including printers, have proclaimed a general strike in support of the prisoners claims.

Paris, Oct. 5th.—The Council of Ambassadors today despatched a note to Germany demanding the immediate release of three ships loaded with muni-
