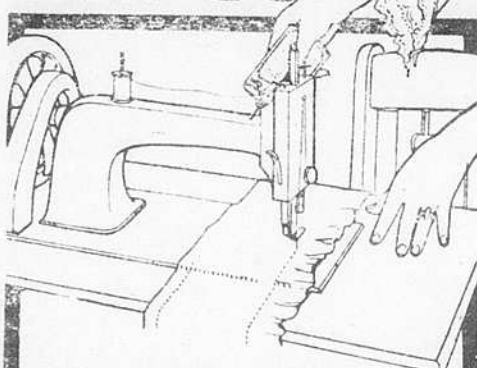
London, July 15th.—The eclipse stakes run today resulted as follows 1st. Craig-an-eran 2nd. Braishfield 3rd. Pompadour.

Washington, July 14th.—A letter from Mr. Lloyd George to President Wilson, dated August 8th, 1920, and dealing with a proposal for the cancelling of interallied war debts, was placed in the record of the senate finance committee today by treasury officials, during the hearing on the administrations Allied loan refunding bill. A cablegram on the same subject from the British chancellor of the exchequer to Mr. Lindsay, representing the British treasury in the country, which was transmitted to the then assistant Secretary of the treasury department, was also presented.

Constantinople, July 15th.—Greek troops have occupied the town of Afium Karahissar an important station on the southern branch of the Bagdad railway it is announced here. The town was given up by the Turks without fighting it is said.

Athens, July 11th.—Greek forces engaged in the offensive against the Turkish nationalist are making progress at each end of the battle line and are not encountering serious resistance says an official statement issued here covering the operations at the front on July 13th. The statement confirms despatches relative to the occupation of Afium Karahissar. The advance of our troops toward Eski Shehrank Kutaia the statement declared continues without serious resistance and we are suffering insignificant losses. During the day of July 13th
