TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, June 3rd. —The death has taken place here of Doctor Simon Baruch, the eminent physician.

London, May 31st. —Another step towards the industrial peace of Great Britain was taken today when the railwaymen dropped their embargo against the transportation of imported, or what was known as tainted coal, in an effort to support the miners now on strike. The embargo was a failure.

Leipzig, May 31st. —The trial of the former Lieutenant Karl Neuman, who was charged with the sinking of the hospital ship "Dover Castle" while in command of a German submarine, during the war, has been stayed. It is declared that a preliminary examination of the case resulted in his complete innocence being established.

Oppeln, June 2d. —The French soldiers forming the garrison of Beuthen, a city in Southern Silesia, near the old Polish frontier, have been attacked by forces organized by the German inhabitants of the town, the situation being complicated by the presence of Polish insurgent forces around the city. The Poles began the fight with the Germans in the outskirts of the town on Sunday, and when the French were attacked the Poles rushed to their assistance. The reports from Beuthen are not entirely clear, but it would appear that the French Commander refused the proffered aid and is holding the Poles from entering the town. The attack by the Germans on the French is said to have been well planned. The telegraph and telephone wires were cut, the sentries driven back and headquarters detachments were surrounded.

Pekin, June 2nd. —The anti Bolshevik volt in Eastern Siberia, which began with the capture of Vladivostok and nearby towns by troops formerly commanded by the late General Kappell, has spread to Blagovyes-Chensk, by the capital of the Amur Province, and the local authorities of that place are said to be defying the Govt. of the far Eastern Republic, which has its capital at Chita. Soviet Officers at Irkutsk, on Lake Baikal, are sending out an appeal for a Communist army to defend the country against a counter revolution. The new Socialist Govt. established at Vladivostok continues to function and the city is reported to be quiet.

New York, May 31st. —Announcements that the President had signed the emergency tariff bill, which includes the duty on raw sugar approximately by sixty cents per hundred pounds, were not received here on Friday until the market had closed, not to reopen until this morning consequently the influence it may have

is purely a matter of conjecture. In conformity with a prior notice, the refiners did not open their sales rooms and the brokers in raw sugars took advantage of the opportunity to make Saturday a full holiday. The last sale of raw sugars reported late on Friday was Porto Rico's at 506 C. I. F., and the recent trend of opinion in the trade has been that the refiners will not consent to pay more than this, except only in the event that there should come such a rush of orders for refined that they would be forced to come into the market, and in case of course the views of the sellers would have very much greater weight than in the recent past.

Tokio, June 2nd. —A communication issued by the Japanese war Govt. at Vladivostok asserted that it is the intention of Japan to adhere to her policy of non-interference in Russian internal politics. A late press advice says that the Chinese Govt. is hastily preparing to establish a front against the Kappel forces at Imane, where the Bolshevik reinforcements are concentrating.

London, June 2nd. —An Oppeln message forwarded by the Berlin correspondent of the Central New Agency says that the inter-Allied high Commission has decided that German defence corps is not to be considered an insurgent body. Describing briefly the fighting in the streets of Beuthen, between the Germans and Poles, which was finally suppressed by the French, an Oppeln despatch to the "Times" says that it was some time since the German's had attempted resistance within the area occupied by the Poles.

London, June 2nd. —The Colonial list of the King's Birthday honours contained nearly a score of Knights including Mr. Squirer, Premiers of Newfoundland. They are mainly public men and officials in Australia and New Zealand.

London, June 3rd. —Among the birthday honours list appear the following: Knight Bachelor, Mr. J. B. Harrison (Government Analyst), British Guiana. Imperial Service Order, Mr. A. E. C. Ross (Postmaster General), Trinidad.

London, June 4th. —In the cricket match Cambridge, versus Australia the latter won by an innings and fourteen runs. Mailey took seven wickets for thirty seven runs in Cambridge's second innings.

London, June 1st. —The race for the Derby Stakes run at Epsom today resulted as follows: Humorist first, Craiganeran second, Lemenora third.

Nottingham, May 28th. —The first test match between the Australians and All England resulted in the former winning by ten wickets.

London, June 3rd. —In the cricket match Australia versus Cambridge the latter scored 205 in their first innings and Australia 362. Pellew 146. Cambridge second innings 111 for 7 wickets.

London, June 1st. —Indications point

to a general rejection of the Govt's. new proposals in connection with the coal settlement. Some of the miners in South Wales, Scotland, Derbyshire, Yorkshire and other large coal fields have already declined to accept the proposals.

Washington, June 1st. —The situation of the British forces in Mesopotamia is reported today in official circles to be increasingly unstable. According to the latest reports, it was represented that the British are faced with the necessity of either withdrawing from the country or adding to their forces already there.

New York, June 1st. —The raw sugar market is unsettled and prices are irregular and difficult to quote.

Melborne, June 1st. —The Federal Govt. has authorized the Premier, Mr. Hughes, who will attend the Imperial Conference in London, to sign the protocol for the establishment of an International Court of Justice.

Oppeln, Silesia June 1st. —Heavy fighting occurred this afternoon in the Possnowitz Woods, near Gross Strehlitz, where the Poles were compelled to fall back before the onslaught of the Germans. A grave situation is reported at Beuthen, where the Germans attacked the French garrison, sharp fighting following in which the Germans were repulsed and a number of them killed. The Poles, who were also fighting the Germans, made an effort to help the French, who refused this aid.

Epsom Downs, June 2nd. —The Race for the oak stakes, run here today, was won by Mr. Watson's "Love in idleness" Mrs. Nugent's "Sleipner" being second and Viscount Astor's "Long Suit" third.
