PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

At one o'clock p. m., Monday July 19, 1920, the Colonial Council of St. Croix held an extraordinary meeting in the Council Hall in Christiansted convened by request of Government.

The members present were: The Vice-

Chairman (Coulter), A. J. Blackwood, G. B. Fleming, M. M. Skeoch, Thos. Ramsay, W. L. Penheny, F. Lunney, K. Henderson, W. S. Abramson, D. Noll, D. C. Canegata and A. E. Stakemann.

His Excellency Governor Admiral Oman and Despatching Secretary (Commander Colby) attended the meeting.

The Chairman (Merwin) being absent the Vice-Chairman (Coulter) took the chair and called the meeting to order.

The Vice-Chairman remarked: Honorable Members, since the last meeting no communications have been received from Government, but I have received today a communication from the citizens of this town protesting against the establishment of a training school for incorrigible girls on Protestant Cay, this I will lay on the table for your perusal.

The Vice-Chairman further remarked: The minutes for the last meeting have been duly published in the "St. Croix Avis", and unless any member take objection I will consider them tacitly adopted.

There being no objection the Vice-Chairman declared the minutes as published tacitly adopted.

The Vice-Chairman then laid before the House Item 1 of the Order of the Day.

Item 1.

Colonial Council Bill No. 41.

Continuation of 1st Discussion on Resolution introduced by Government authorizing the establishment and management of a training school

on Protestant Cay for incorrigible girls.

Despatching Secretary (Commander Colby) remarked: Mr. Chairman, I have received the following communication from the Governor which I will read to the Council:

15 July, 1920

From: Governor
To: Despatching Secretary.
Subject: Bill No. 41, Colonial Council for the Municipality of St. Croix.

1. The Government desires to withdraw Bill No. 41, Colonial Council for the Municipality of St. Croix for the following reasons:

From the reports of the last meeting, the Governor is led to believe that certain members of this Council, and, possibly, the constituency which they represent, are loathe to place full faith and confidence in the motives of the Government in presenting this measure, and, apparently, are inclined to believe the Resolution was offered with ulterior motives. It can be seen from reading the reports, that by innuendo, the Government is accused of attempting to delay, hinder and retard the laudable ambition of the people of Christiansted to commercialize their harbor by eliminating an objectionable reef. Apparently, some believe that a training school, such as proposed, would not be a training school, but an institution tending to demoralize, rather than moralize the inmates. It is also noted that the present Government is accused of having no intent to fulfill the promises which appear in the Resolution, or which might have appeared by specific amendment, but that the feeling seemed rather to be among certain members that this administration could not be trusted any further than past administration.

The accusations which appear in the report are not true, but the Government feels that, rather than be mistrusted in the slightest degree, it will prefer to establish this institution within the Municipality of St. Thomas and St. John, although such action would mean considerable delay and, consequently, a large number of girls who need immediate reformatory attention will be deprived of such benefit.
