TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, Dec. 13th.—The new quadruple treaty to preserve peace in the Pacific was formally signed today by the Plenipotentiaries of the United States, Great Britain, France and Japan. The text of the United States reservation follows. "In signing the treaty this day between the United States of America, the British Empire, France and Japan, it is declared to be the understanding and intent of the signatory Powers. 1 That the treaty shall apply to the mandated islands in the Pacific Ocean, provided, however that the making of the treaty shall not be deemed to be an assent on the part of the United States of America to the mandates and shall not preclude agreements between the United States of America and the mandatory Powers respectively in relation to mandated islands. 2 That the controversies to which the second paragraph of article one refers shall not be taken to embrace questions which according to principles of international law, lie exclusively within the domestic jurisdiction of the respective Powers."
