London, Aug. 14th.—Earl Grey will leave for the United States to assume the post as temporary Ambassador, probably early in September and will be accompanied by Sir Wm. Tyrell, a large staff also will be with the Ambassador to take the routine of affairs out of his hand and thus permitting Earl Grey to devote his time to large questions. Earl Grey whose health has been a subject of concern, is now enjoying excellent health. Sir Wm. Tyrell was the late Secretary to Earl Grey for eight years returning in 1915 he visited the United States in the fall of 1913 to discuss the Mexican situation with the Government.

Paris, Aug. 16th.—Sweden Norway and Denmark are sending a collective note to the Entente, relative to the league of nations according to the Berlin Frankfort Gazette.

London, Aug. 16th.—The Associated Press great efforts are being made in connection with a memorial to freedom and peace which the national labour party proposes to erect in London in commemoration of the killed and wounded and incapacitated soldiers. Circulars are being issued to trade Unionists everywhere throughout the British Isles urging their early attention to this matter in view of the fact that the enterprise is proposed to create worthy headquarters for labour which will provide suitable conference accommodation a well stocked library etc. it is hoped to begin the building operations early in next year.

Berlin, Aug. 16th.—Financial leaders here express the opinion that formation of the world financial pool calculated to stabilize the International situation inevitable in central Europe as well as the entente countries escape after the war cataclysm.

Budapest, Aug. 15th.—The Socialists became conciliated and agreed to join the new cabinet when the Archduke Joseph Governor of State today reiterated his intention to retire from politics when the Cabinet was definitely formed, Socialists feared Royalist influences would be used in the coming elections for the proposed conference.

London, Aug. 16th.—Several battalions of Bolshevik troops have been wiped out in the new counter offensive of the north Russian army along the river Luga southeast of Petrograd according to a despatch from Helsingfors dated Wednesday the Soviet forces also lost a large number of prisoners, machine guns and ammunition.

London, Aug. 16th.—Mr. Joseph Devlin nationalists member of Parliament for Belfast addressing a meeting of nationalists yesterday at Blackrock Ireland made an appeal for the old na-

tionalist policy as against the Sinn Fein policy in the matter of abstention from attendance upon sessions of Parliament. Mr. Devlin contended that the presence of eighty Irish members at Westminster during the peace conference would have changed Ireland's fate because every voice was raised for freedom in the House of Commons resounded through the two Hemispheres.

Londonderry, Aug. 16th.—Soldiers were used in suppressing rioters between nationalists and unionists in Londonderry last night, and early today they were withdrawn from the scenes of disorder this morning, a number of rioters were injured during charges of the police and soldiers.

London, Aug. 16th.—Despatches received in London by way of Berlin says the new Hungarian cabinet headed by Herr Lovass has fallen. One despatch credited to be the Budapest correspondent of the Berlin Vossische Zeitung declares another cabinet which is conservative has been formed. The Vossische Zeitung list of the latest cabinet embraces Herr Freidrich as Premier and Herr Lovassy as Foreign Minister in complete dispatches from the correspondent of the Associated Press Budapest says the failure of the Lovassy Governments considered to be due mainly to socialists insisting at last that insufficient guarantees of democratic Govt. has been given. This despatch adds that the Archduke Joseph regime was credited with having made mistakes in having while proclaiming it desired to cooperate with Socialists who made war on everything communistic with which a certain element of socialists was in sympathy with several thousand communists, the despatch says, were arrested including the ex-Soviet President, Garbal because he was also considered to be moderate.

Paris, Aug. 16th.—Samuel Gompers the President of the American Federation of labor who has been attending a labour conference at Amsterdam and has been spending a few days here will sail from Brest on Sunday for the United States on board the George Washington, he is going home in response to urgent cablegrams calling upon him to cut short his visit in Europe.

Paris, 16th.—Rumania is not to be permitted to strip Hungary according to a draft of the Supreme Councils reply to the last note from Bucharest which was completed at yesterday's meeting of council.

Berlin, Aug. 16th.—Germany in a note refusing the allied demand to recall General Von Der Goltz the German commander in the Baltic denies the charge that the German evacuation of Letvia has been delayed purposely and says it has been proceeding in accordance with the plan arranged in the conference between the German commander and the British General Cough the allied com-

mander on July 19th. Germany's note adds that she cannot meet any demands going beyond article twelve of the armistice demand for the recall of Goltz and asserted that it is an encroachment on the authority of Germany which reserves the rights to recall General Goltz when the evacuation of Letvia was sufficiently advanced the note adds that great bitterness has been caused among the German volunteers in the Baltic region by the failure of the Ullman Govt. in Letvia to grant Lettish soldiers citizenship to those who desire it. The German Govt. warns allies against increasing the present possibilities of friction in Letvia by being over hasty with the withdrawal of German troops.

London, Aug. 16th.—Important speeches on the Govt policy it is expected will be made by Mr. Lloyd George when the Mover at the adjournment of the House of Commons on Monday the premiers anticipated speeches in execution of the extreme interest in political circles.

Paris, Aug. 17th.—Candidacy of Mr. Albert Thomas in the forthcoming legislative elections in Alsace Lorraine is announced by 2 Mr. Thomas is a French socialist leader and minister of munition.

Lisbon, Aug. 15th. It is announced today that 21 German ships now in English ports will be handed over to Portugal.

Budapest, Aug. 16th. Several British monitors and two patrol boats arrived here yesterday to guard the Danube the shipping crews are being joyfully greeted by the population.

Weimar, Aug. 16th.—President Ebert will take the oath under the new constitution before the National Assembly on August 20th., he has withdrawn the decree which designates the assembly as the Reichstag in defence to protests from the Assembly.

Winnepeg, Man., Aug. 17th.—Unofficial but reliable source as learned the Canadian wheat board decided on fixing dollars 2.15 as the minimum price for 1919.

London, Aug. 17th.—Reuter's learns position in the Bolshevik Govt. of Russia is daily becoming more serious and precarious. Events in Budapest and the armatic fall of Bela Kun there exercised most demoralizing influence in the ranks of the Bolsheviks.

Washington, Aug. 16th.—William Cummings the British Charged archieves in the city of Mexico has been ordered to leave the country by General Carranza while not specifically stated in the despatches from Mexicans which have reached Washington it is understood General Carranza action is the result of a statement recently made in the House of Commons by the British under Secretary that Great Britain had not recognized the Carranza Govt. and would not do so until some guarantee that the Mexican Govt. was willing to protect the lives and property of British citizens in Mexico.
