

in guns and in men killed and wounded, prisoners and deserters. The great part of the Turkish divisions lost most of their effectives.

London, July 26th.—Mr. Austen Chamberlain, leader in the House of Commons, today foreshadowed the possibility of Parliament being summoned again in November or December to pass legislation necessary to effect an Irish settlement.

London, July 26th.—The Supreme Allied Council will meet in Paris August 4th, according to an official announcement this morning. It is understood that the session will be brief, dealing only with the Silesian question. Lord Curzon and Mr. Balfour will represent Great Britain. It is improbable that Mr. Lloyd George will be able to leave London. The British experts who will examine the Silesian question before the council meeting, already have left for Paris. The call for this meeting of the Supreme Council comprises to a degree the differences between Great Britain and France over the procedure to be adopted in connection with Upper Silesia where the situation, owing to the continued German and Polish rivalry in the disputed area, is said to be increasingly threatening. The action was forecasted in despatches from Paris Monday night indicating that Great Britain had agreed to a meeting of the Supreme Council on August 4th and a preliminary examination into the Upper Silesian problem by a committee of experts as France has desired. There are said to be divergencies between the two Governments, however, over the sending of reinforcements to Upper Silesia. France considering this action necessary and Great Britain taking the opposite view. It is understood that the United States Ambassador, Mr. Harvey, will attend the Supreme Council session in an advisory and unofficial capacity.

New York, July 26th.—Raw sugar was quiet early today, but the undertone was firm and prices were unchanged at three cents for Cuba's, cost and freight, equal to 4.61 for centrifugal. There were no change in refined prices.

Manchester, July 25th.—The fourth test match between the Australia and the All-England cricket teams was drawn today in favour of England. Tennyson declared the overnight score of 362 for four wickets. Australian scored badly, losing Bardsley 9 runs. The bowlers held the upper hand through the draw. Collins being the only Australian to make a long stand. He showed marvellous patience, and in an innings occupying 150 minutes scored 22 runs. The Australian innings closed with 175 runs, England in the second innings lost one wicket for 44 runs. The match was consequently drawn, with a total of 406 runs for England, against 175 for Australia.

Washington, July 26th.—Signs of in

surgency against the extremely high tariff rates of the House Tariff Bill are developing in the Senate. A speech by Senator K. Nicholson, Minnesota, veteran Republican, warning his colleagues that this is a critical time for tariff making, that it will not do to follow the old lines, and that other countries must be given chance to trade with the United States, is regarded as highly significant. Lines are forming in the Senate for a bitter fight against many features of the bill. Reports that Canadian trade with the United States will be heavily curtailed and that Canada may make tariff reprisals, are a potent cause of the opposition to the bill.

Tokio, July 26th.—The Japanese cabinet has decided to accept participation in the proposed conference on near Eastern problems, the Associated Press was informed today. It is understood that the Japanese answer will be forwarded to Washington in the near future.

Paris, July 26th.—Ratifications of the peace treaty with Hungary, were exchanged at the Quai D'Orsay today. The ceremony, which lasted twenty minutes, was presided over by M. Cambon. The minutes of the proceedings were signed by the representatives of the principal powers and Governments affected by the treaty or its annexes, and the Hungarian Minister to France, Ivan Kraxnovs.

London, July 26th.—Sugar in stock on the 23rd inst. was 180,000 tons. Last year 156,000 tons.
