ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Feb. 9th.—The sensational story cabled from London by the correspondent of a United States newspaper agency on Monday night, stating that an official of the British Foreign Office had issued a statement alleging Anglo-American relations to be strained, was generally discredited here. None of the leading New York papers printed the story yesterday, though today editions carry despatches from Washington or London deprecating it. It is generally believed that if such a statement was made it was altogether unofficial and was merely presented in the form of a request to the correspondents to exercise care in handling news dealing with matters which might possibly cause ill-feeling in either country, the correspondent who sent the story not understanding its confidential nature. A special from Washington to the "World" quotes Secretary of State Colby as saying, "The report, as it reached me,
