The Virginia arrived at Frederiksted

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin, March 30th.—Communists up-
 risings which had appeared to be at the
 point of collapse, have flickered up
 again in various sections of Germany

Constantinople, March, 30th. An en-
 tire Greek division has been captured by
 the Turks at Eskishhelir and the Greeks
 are fleeing from that city, according to
 notices posted up in Anatolia. The
 Greeks thus far have made no state-
 ment.

Geneva, March 30th.—The Internation-
 al Red Cross Committee today elected as
 president Gustave Adon, former Presi-
 dent of Switzerland and as vice-President
 Sir Edward Stewart of Great Britain.

London, March 30th.—A coal strike
 seems inevitable on April first, when
 the notices of the mine owners of a ter-
 mination of contract in order to enforce
 a reduction in wages will expire. The
 executives of the miners federation met
 today and resolved to instruct all bran-
 ches of the miners union to cease work.
 The executive then proceeded to the
 Board of Trade, when an interview
 was held with Sir Robert Horne, the
 President of the Board. The miners de-
 manded that the Government subsidize the
 industry so as to enable it to pay wages
 greater than the present profits and also
 advocated the pooling of profits for the
 benefit of less profitable mines. Sir Ro-
 bert on behalf of the govt declined to
 consent to a subsidy. He said most of
 the other great industries were in a
 worse condition than the coal industry
 and that it was impossible for the state
 to provide such help. Mr Herbert Smith
 vice-President of the Miners Federation,
 on behalf of the miners executive then
 informed Sir Robert Horne of the decisi-
