

Cloyne, County Cork has been burned. One hundred men attacked the police barracks at Long's Gorge, County Galway, but were beaten off.

London, May 29th.—The Manchester Cup which was run yesterday was won by Pomme de Terre. Square Measure second and Happy Man third. Eleven horses ran.

London, May 28th.—The German Minister of Finance has introduced a censorship of telegrams, in order to prevent the illegal exportation of capital and gold, according to a wireless message received from Berlin.

London, May 28th.—Mr. Watt, Treasurer of the Commonwealth of Australia, speaking here last night, intimated that he proposed shortly to lay before city businessmen a scheme for consolidating the Empire's debts. He had already laid it before the authorities in another quarter and he thought that the scheme would lighten the load both on the homeland and the dominions. Mr. Watt also announced the early initiation of an extensive commonwealth immigration campaign.

Ottawa, May 28th.—Canada's claim against Germany for reparation for losses sustained by that country and individual citizens during the war, has been forwarded to England for presentation at the conference of representatives of all parts of the British Empire soon to be held in London and subsequently at the inter-allied conference at Spa. The bill rendered by the Dominion is for a total of \$1,869,000,000. The total is made up of the following items. Cost of war and demobilization \$1,715,000,000. Halifax losses \$30,000,000. Separation allowances \$85,000,000. Illegal warfare \$31,000,000. By Halifax losses is evidently meant the damages occasioned to that city by the explosion of the munitions ship Mont Blanc in 1917. It is estimated that Canada and other British dominions will share in the indemnity received by the British Empire in proportion to which their expenditures bear to the total expenditures of the Empire.

London, May 27th.—Hostilities between the Russians and Japanese in Siberia ceased on May 25th, according to a Reuter despatch from Vladivostok, dated Wednesday.

Washington, May 28th.—While the President's bold and audacious policy for the navy was sound, the specific operation he advocated to crush the German U-boatnets was impracticable, for technical reasons, Admiral Sims yesterday told the Senate Naval Investigation Committee.

London, May 28th.—If there is anybody left who thinks the ex-Kaiser may still be tried, Mr. Bonar Law, speaking for the Govt., begs to disillusion him. The following statement by Mr. Bonar Law would seem to be final. "Holland refused to surrender Wilhelm. The Al-

lies have tried their best to get the Dutch Govt. to take other action, but they have not succeeded, and they do not propose to use force".

CUBAN SUGAR CROP PRODUCTION TO MARCH 31ST

Messrs. Guma and Mejer, the well-known Cuban statisticians, have issued their annual monthly statement concerning the sugar production in Cuba this season up to and including March 31st.

and comparing the same with each of the previous two years. The total production to March 31st. insofar as deliveries at the ports are concerned, amounts to 1,990,916 long tons. This includes the local consumption which is only estimated at 24,500 tons for one-fourth of a year, and would seem to be quite a small consumption for more than two millions of people in the land where so much sugar is made.

The production reported to March 31st. inclusive, this year, practically two millions of tons, stands out as against a million and three quarters at the same date last year, and as against nearly a million and three quarters the year before.

Of the sugars thus produced 1,307,000 long tons have already been exported, leaving 659,000 tons in the warehouses in Cuba. At the same date, the exports last year reached 929,000 long tons, and the year before 817,000 long tons. Of the exported sugar, 828,000 tons went to ports north of Hatteras; 95,000 tons to New Orleans; 7,000 tons to the interior of the United States; 15,000 tons to Galveston; 29,000 tons to Savannah; 40,000 tons to Canada; 6,000 tons to Spain; and 287,000 tons to Europe. It will be noted here that the three ports north of Hatteras and New Orleans together got over 900,000 tons of sugar, while all of Europe including Spain, got but 292,000 tons, or, but about one-third of what our Atlantic and Gulf ports got, which is very suggestive of the large exports of sugars to Europe from the Atlantic and Gulf ports.

It would seem now to be generally admitted that the final output of sugar from Cuba will leave the world in a comparatively impoverished condition, so far as that great staple is concerned.—
