BY THE GOVERNOR
OF THE VIRGIN ISLANDS
OF THE UNITED STATES.

A Proclamation.

WHEREAS, under authority of an Ordinance, entitled "An Ordinance to regulate Commerce in Intoxicating Drinks and Drugs, and to Provide Penalties for Violations Thereof", passed by the Colonial Council for St. Croix on the tenth day of June, 1918, and sanctioned and approved by the Governor on the 20th day of June, 1918; and an Ordinance, entitled "An Ordinance to Regulate Commerce in Intoxicating Drinks and Drugs, and to provide Penalties for Violations thereof", passed by the Colonial Council for St. Thomas and St. John on the second day of July 1918, and sanctioned and approved by the Governor on the ninth day of July, 1918, it has been heretofore lawful to import beverage malt liquors into the Virgin Islands of the United States:

AND WHEREAS, the President of the United States on 23 November, 1921 approved Bill-Public No. 96-67th Congress, the same being entitled "An Act Supplemental to the National Prohibition Act" section three of which Act directly concerns the Virgin Islands of the United States, and reads as follows: "Sec. 3. That this Act and the National Prohibition Act shall apply not only to the United States, but to all territory subject to its jurisdiction, including the territory of Hawaii and the Virgin Islands: and jurisdiction is conferred on the courts of the Territory of Hawaii and the Virgin Islands to enforce this Act and the National Prohibition Act in such Territory and Islands."

NOW THEREFORE, I, Sumner E. W. Kittelle, Governor of the Virgin Islands of the United States, by virtue of the power conferred upon me by Act of Congress of March 3, 1917, do hereby proclaim that beer now in transit and upon the high seas destined for the Virgin Islands of the United States will be permitted to enter, but that hereafter intoxicating liquor, including alcohol, brandy, whiskey, rum, gin, beer, ale, porter and wine, and in addition thereto any spirituous, vinous, malt, or fermented liquor, liquids, and compounds, whether medicated proprietary, patented, or not, and by whatever name called, containing one half of one percentum or more of alcohol by volume which are fit for use for beverage purposes, except as otherwise provided in the National Prohibition Act, shall not be imported or permitted to enter, except as otherwise specified above, and that a reasonable time will be allowed the retailers who have heretofore sold beer to dispose of stock now on hand.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of

the Government of the Virgin Islands of the United States to be affixed.

LOCAL.

The s. s. "Marina" is due at Christiansted at daylight tomorrow morning having 21 tons of cargo for Christiansted and 50 tons for Frederiksted. This being a fine opportunity for passengers to avail themselves with the voyage to Frederiksted by sea. Steamer leaving 9 o'clock.

Radio news received here announces congressional action making the Volstead act applicable to the Virgin Islands, with the discontinuance of sale of beer or any alcoholic drinks after present stocks are sold out. From the same source it is understood that Congressman Campbell, who was among the Commissioners who visited these islands, has introduced a bill to grant Statehood to the island of Porto Rico which will then elect its own Governor and other heads of Government.
