Calcutta, June 2nd.—Lieuts. Pair and Beires, the Portuguese aviators on a flight from Lisbon to Macao, China, arrived here on Sunday from Allahabad, where they flew from Ambala.

London, June 2nd.—The Foreign Office announces the raising of the Portuguese legation in London to an Embassy.

London, June 2nd.—Mr. Cosgrave and Sir James Craig had a conference with the Premier at Chequers Court on Saturday. The three statesmen talked together for several hours, discussing the boundary question from all its aspects, but no official statement of what took place has been issued and it is not known whether any arrangements have been made for another meeting.

London, June 2nd.—Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier, is quoted by the Daily Sketch as saying that so far as Northern Ireland is concerned the boundary dispute situation remains the same, following Saturday's conference at Chequers Court, and there has been no suggestion for a further meeting so far as he is aware.

Mukden, June 2nd.—Captain Doisy, flying from Paris to Tokio, arrived here at eleven o'clock this morning on his way to Tokio.

Constantinople, June 2nd.—Sir Percy Cox, British High Commissioner for Mesopotamia, today informed Fathi Bey,

speaker of the Turkish Assembly and head of the Turkish Delegation regarding the Mosul District, that he had been instructed to return to London unless the Turkish Government modified the attitude it has taken in demanding complete rendition of the disputed territory.

Paris, June 2nd.—M. Herriot, the prospective Premier, speaking before a joint caucus of the Radical and Radical Socialist Parties tonight, came out flatly for adoption of the Dawes report and gave assurances that his financial policy would be sane and founded on rigorous balancing of the budget. M. Herriot emphasized that there was no after thought attached to his approval of the experts plans.

London, June 2nd.—No new peerages have been created on the occasion of the King's Birthday tomorrow and the Labour Govt's first honours are in the way of rewards for service in the state of semi-diplomatic departments. The only Privy Councilorship in the honours list has been conferred on Mr. T. P. O'Connor, who has represented the Scotland Division of Liverpool in the House of Commons as a Nationalist since 1885 and is internationally known as a newspaperman, as well as a legislator and orator. The privy councilorship has been conferred on Mr. O'Connor, it is recorded officially, as "for political services," but there is little doubt that the recognition really arises through Tay Pay's standing as a newspaper man and because of his present position as father of the House of Commons.

London, June 2nd.—Knight of the Garter, His Majesty's candidate for the Derby, the chief of the three year old classics which is to be run at Epsom on Wednesday of this week, will be a starter, it was definitely decided today. Two eruptions that caused a leg to swell slightly were noticed on Saturday and the colt was not out for morning exercise. This morning Knight of the Garter was given a couple of six furlongs gallops with Archibald up. The colt was kept moving freely and the leg appeared to be no worse after the gallops. Everything points to a most interesting Derby, certainly the most open one in many years. The consensus of opinion seems to be that any of the candidates may win. Tipsters mostly agree to differ about the result. Neither H. H. Aga Khan, nor Lord Astor, who will be represented in the race by two horses, is disposed to make any predictions regarding the outcome. The Aga Khan's Diophon, who has shown consistently good form since winning the two thousand guineas race, is installed as favorite, while his racing mate Salmon Trout is also well up in the betting. Lord Astor's horses Stgermans and Bright Knight are given fourth and fifth positions in the betting. The field includes two French horses, Optimist 11 and Thunder Cloud 11, both of which have already arrived in England. Speaking at a Press

Club luncheon today Lord Derby said, with a field of thirty one for the Derby and a torrential rain falling, I should put the names of the horses in a hat draw out one and back it.

Constantinople, June 2nd.—The Council of Commisars held a six hour discussion at Angora yesterday on a difficult situation which has arisen between Turkey and Italy. The Turkish representatives at Rome had been instructed to ask an explanation for the alleged concentration of troops in Sicily and for other Italian military activities, while the military authorities in Smyrna have been ordered to take all the necessary precautionary measures. According to the Turkish press, the Government is dissatisfied with the explanation of the Italian Charge d'Affairs here that the few Italian soldiers who landed in Rhodes were only celebrating the anniversary of the annexation of the Dodecanese Islands.
